In the hope of obtaining a contract from the U.S. government to produce copper coins the Birmingham firm of William and Alexander Walker commissioned John Gregory Hancock (c. 1750 -1805) to design a copper cent, with the bust of George Washington on the obverse and an American eagle on the reverse. The coins, dated 1791 and with two basic types of reverse design executed from dies by Hancock's assistant John Jorden, were struck at the manufactory of John ( $\dagger$ March 1792) and Obadiah Westwood in Birmingham, and the Walkers shipped some to their American associate, Thomas Ketland \& Son, in Philadelphia, where the coins were to be distributed to senators and people of influence in the hope, it was thought, of securing a federal minting contract (see lots 1127 and 1128 in this auction).

Washington rejected the idea of having his portrait on coins as overly monarchical, but nevertheless the Westwood-struck pieces entered circulation. Influenced by such as Thomas Paine and Thomas Jefferson, Washington was convinced that a federal mint should be established and coins should bear 'an impression emblematic of Liberty', but this news was not received by those in Birmingham who proceeded to issue a tiny number of undenominated large eagle patterns in 1792, where the space on the coin for the denomination was replaced with an arch of 13 stars. Of these, the standard authorities (Bowers, Fuld and Breen) differ marginally in their estimates of known examples, but it can be said with a degree of confidence that only some half-dozen pieces of each edge type (lettered or plain) are known; the cataloguer of the Norweb specimen was of the opinion that there were fewer lettered edge examples extant than those with a plain edge.

The finest example in private hands was that formerly owned by Mrs Norweb, slabbed by PCGS and graded AU 53, auctioned by Stack's in November 2006 for $\$ 253,000$ (previously thought to be ex Waldo Newcomer); others offered in auctions in the past decade were at the Heritage Long Beach sale in September 2009 (a damaged specimen, possibly that once in the Robert Coulton Davis sale of $1890, \$ 48,875)$, and the Benson specimen, with traces of silver plating and graded as EF-40 (Goldberg, Beverly Hills, February 2001, lot 119, \$48,300). The captaincy of Pernambuco in north eastern Brazil was a Portuguese colony from the 16th century. The Dutch tried to extend their influence there in the 1620 and in 1630 succeeded in capturing Olinda and Recife. The wealth of the territory, based on sugar production, gave the Dutch West India Company good reason to establish and try and hold this province of New Holland, However, the Portuguese were reluctant to relinquish control and struggles continued into the 1640s. During a revolt in 1645 the Portuguese recaptured much of the territory and by 1654 the Dutch were driven from their last stronghold at Recife.

The emergency coinages of 1645-6 and 1654 were struck when Pernambuco was besieged by the Portuguese. An Instruction of 10 October 1645 ordered the mintmaster, Pieter Janssen Bas, to strike gold coins equal to 4, 2 and 1 Brazilian ducats. The gold came from Guinea, the West Indies and elsewhere. The diecutter was Jan Bruynsvelt

Although a lease had been granted in 1891 to the Nationale Bank of the Zuid Afrikaansche Republiek to establish a state mint in Pretoria, President Kruger was anxious to get new coins into circulation and placed an order with the Royal Prussian mint at Berlin. The task of engraving the dies was assigned to Otto Schultz (1848-1911), the Berliner who had enjoyed a varied career working with the Loos medallic business in the city and with L.C. Wyon at the Royal Mint, London, before joining the Berlin mint as Second Medallist under Emil Weigand (1837-1906). Initially Schultz engraved the ox-wagon on the three largest denominations with two shafts, instead of the single shaft of the disselboom [wagon with a single pole] represented in the arms of the Republic. This, and the fact that Schultz placed his initials below the bust of Kruger, which were interpreted in Afrikaans as ox, meant that the first shipment of coins from Berlin were ill-received in the Republic. On Kruger's orders the dies were altered and it was not until 1893 that the new Pretoria mint started striking 1892-dated coins from Berlin-prepared dies
