


VIEWING

David Brandon Griffiths (1940-2011)



Initially he collected Welsh 17th century tokens, triggered by the 1973 publication of George Boon's book on the subject. But, finding out how much individual 17th century tokens cost and, encouraged by Monica Bussell (1906-74) at Seaby's, David decided to start collecting Welsh 18th century tokens, principally Anglesey. He put together what is believed to be the largest collection of these pieces ever assembled.

David soon expanded his 17th century token interests to cover Hertfordshire, of which county his collection is the largest of its kind ever formed, and other counties, in particular Middlesex, Bedfordshire, Berkshire, Buckinghamshire, Hampshire, Lincolnshire, Rutland and Shropshire. His collection of 18th century tokens covers all counties, with a particularly large group of Middlesex tokens, and his smaller 19th century collection includes tickets, checks and medals.

Having dispersed his library of token literature in these rooms a year ago, David's token collection, the subject of 38 years of dedicated collecting, will feature in a group of auctions staged by DNW over the coming years, beginning here with his 18th century tokens of the counties from Bedfordshire to Middlesex, 359 pieces in total. Among them are excellent representations of Buckinghamshire and Hertfordshire, his local areas, along with a good run of issues associated with Robert Orchard, the Sawbridgeworth brewer, and David Alves Rebello, the Jewish merchant domiciled in Hackney. There are a number of silver proofs and particularly good groups of the extensive issues made for the quack chemist Basil Burchell from London's Long Acre and the bookseller James Lackington, based at Finsbury Square. Provenance was important to David and there are pieces here from virtually all the significant dispersals of tokens held since the Davis sale in 1901.

A regular at the annual British Token Congress for many years, David single-handedly ran the 1998 event at Hemel Hempstead and was a co-organiser of the Congress when it visited Warwick in 2008.

David was principal of a firm of chartered accountants and continued to add selectively to the core elements of his token collection in his retirement. Apart from coins David had many other interests, principally politics, and was a long-term Liberal Democrat, contesting two parliamentary and two European seats. He retired as treasurer of the European Liberals comparatively recently; formerly he was treasurer of the Liberal Democrats and Liberal International. He was also for many years treasurer of the National Benevolent Fund for the Aged. Away from business, he followed the fortunes of his beloved Queens Park Rangers football club in west London and was a regular at Loftus Road, looking forward to his team's newlywon promotion to the Premier League.

Sadly, David succumbed to a lengthy illness on 3 September 2011. He leaves a son, Gareth, daughter Justine and three grandchildren, Daniel, Joshua and Rex. A regular attender at almost all the significant British token auctions since 1982, he was a familiar figure who plotted new acquisitions, whether in the saleroom or from a dealer's list, with an assiduous purpose, set himself limits and was not often bested for something he really wanted. I will miss him and our frequent lunches, a chance for me to escape the city for the Chiltern hills and a hostelry with no cellphone signal and for him to likewise escape from the demands of his beloved BlackBerry and catch up with all the latest token gossip.



Dr Allen Bennett



y fascination with numismatics started in the 1950s. A kindly middle-aged gentleman, Aldo Basso, had a small coin shop on 25th Avenue in San Mateo, California. Many happy hours were spent in that pipe smoke-saturated cubby hole studying his inventory. I formed a nice United States type collection from the 1850-1950 period, using savings from my paper routes. I also traded Aldo some fine-ish but rare silver dollars my grandparents had given me. Shortly thereafter, a large hoard of silver dollars was released and those rare dollars became common overnight. After that, Aldo did not want any more of my 'junk'. My type set was eventually stolen and never recovered.

After leaving home, I had quite a few false starts before finding my way in this world. During those many years I was so impoverished that collecting was out of the question but the fantasy did not die. A few years into my medical practice in Southern California, I occasionally enjoyed the wonderful hospitality and beautiful inventory at Goldbergs' Superior coin shop in Beverly Hills, when they were just off Wilshire Blvd. You never knew who you would see in that shop. One weekend I looked up and Johnny Cash was sitting next to me. I almost fell off my stool. He was deeply religious and was interested in Roman coinage from the time of Christ.

In 1982, Bowers and Ruddy published a fixed-price list offering of the John Adams Collection. I was instantly captivated with 1794 large cents and tried unsuccessfully to purchase several lots. Stack's offered the Floyd Starr collection in 1984. It contained a beautiful Sheldon-32 that Virgil Brand once owned. After winning this lot at \$9,900 (\$100 less than my maximum) there was no turning back...the little pebble started an avalanche. Over the next 16 years I aggressively pursued collectible 1794 obverse varieties 'by the portrait'. Del Bland, Jack Robinson, Tony Terranova and Eric Streiner were essential in making choice material available. I met several excellent collectors in the Early American Coppers Club, including Darwin Palmer, Dan Trollan, Al Boka, Dan Holmes and Wes Rasmussen. Also my colleague Robert Schuman, who is a distinguished connoisseur of 1794 large cents and Hard Times tokens. Jack and Sondra Beymer...still dealing from their shop in Santa Rosa, California...are quite simply two admirable human beings. Walter

Husak, cherished friend and well-known collector of early American large cents, bought my 1794 collection intact over a period of years from 1998 to 2001. He sold his collection at a now-famous Heritage sale in 2008.

My interest in Conder tokens was triggered by a visit with Jerry and Sharon Bobbe in the mid-1990s. Their fabulous collection and passionate enthusiasm were an unimprovable introduction. Since then, multiple major auctions and price lists have been sources of new material. It has been a good time to be collecting 18th century British provincial tokens. The *CTCJ* has provided regular additions to our growing knowledge about the series.

I have sought out D&H varieties with interesting designs, always seeking specimens with beautiful overall eye appeal and surface quality. The best tokens are really charming miniature art objects. My personal favourites include halfpennies with dramatic late die states and overstrikes with clear undertypes. 'Just right' examples of three much-loved and desired varieties have proven elusive: Lancashire 2 (in copper), Middlesex 676 and Middlesex 1063.

It has been a pleasure and privilege to know Joel Spingarn, Allan Davisson, the late Wayne Anderson and the late Douglas McHenry. The 'Mad Monarch', Jerry Bobbe, has been a continuous font of knowledge and a remarkable source of material. His assistance has been essential. Thank you, MM!

I hope that several new collectors will purchase examples from my collection. Beauty is a wonderful fertilizer that energizes the transition from acorn to mighty oak. In seeing these tokens move to new homes I fervently hope that their next custodians will resist urges to 'improve' their prizes. Such efforts almost invariably do more harm than good. Wrapping tokens in jewellers' tissue is inconvenient, but it does afford the optimum preservation.

This auction probably marks the end of my numismatic adventures. Most collectors cannot stay focused on just one area and I share this characteristic. My collections of specimen sea shells, contemporary Japanese wood-fired stoneware, contemporary wood turnings and contemporary art are still growing. They provide formidable challenges, daily life-enrichment and welcome sanctuaries from our current problem-filled world.

Cataloguer's note

The 299 pieces that form Dr Bennett's collection represent the finest quality group of 18th century tokens to appear in an auction catalogue since the dispersal of the late Wayne Anderson's holdings in 2000. Many of them were exhibited at the Token Congress in Seattle in May 2009. In accordance with DNW house style, they have been catalogued by location rather than by denomination as in Dalton and Hamer; in this way pieces relative to each other and specific to a particular locality are easier to find.

While collectors always seek to obtain the best in whatever field they pursue, the Bennett pieces are for the most part simply stunning and represent a magnificent testament to a numismatist who has only ever settled for the very best quality he could find. Fully two-thirds of the collection was acquired directly from Jerry Bobbe, whose commitment to, and passion for, the series is without peer in North America.

Among the great rarities and classic tokens here are a James Bisset halfpenny without pictures (lot 405), white metal trials for Elmsthorpe and Tamworth (lots 236 and 375), a perfect Swainson (lot 273), two stunning George Barker pennies (lots 400-1), a uniface trial of Thomas Welch (lot 415), a top quality 'Sir Original' (lot 409), and much else besides. Robinson S. Brown Jr (1917-2005)



orn in Louisville, Kentucky, on 6 May 1917, Robinson Swearingen Brown Jr, or 'Robbie' to his many friends, was the grandson of George Garvin Brown (1846-1917), a pharmaceutical salesman who, with his half-brother John Thompson Street Brown Jr, established J.T.S. Brown & Bro., whiskey blenders and marketers, in 1870. What began as a small local concern bottling and selling Old Forester, their original brand of premier bourbon, evolved over time into the Brown-Forman Corporation, today one of the world's top ten wine and spirit organisations.

Robbie's uncle, the outgoing Owsley Brown (1879-1952), who started work at the company in 1904, assumed the management of it from G.G. Brown in 1917. In 1934 Owsley's younger brother, Robinson Swearingen Brown Sr (1886-1968), joined the company's senior management team who directed the firm through the precocious years of Prohibition and the Great Depression, enabling the succeeding generation of management to expand the product line beyond Kentucky in the 1950s and 1960s with the acquisition of Jack Daniel's Tennessee whiskey, Old Bushmills Irish whiskey, Southern Comfort and other brands.

Growing up in Louisville during the Depression, Robbie studied engineering at the University of Virginia. During World War II he was a pilot in the Army Air Corps. Honourably discharged with the rank of captain in 1945 he returned to the family firm, where he rose to become Brown-Forman's first executive director of sales and marketing. He was elected chairman in 1971 and retired from that office in June 1982.

Robbie was also very active in social, civic and political affairs, serving on a number of boards and committees. In late 1956, while working in Brown-Forman's public relations and personnel department, he was asked to head a committee planning events for the 1957 Kentucky Derby Festival and appointed the first chairman of the modern Derby. Believing in doing things right, Robbie requested a three months leave from work in early 1957 to ensure it ran successfully. Subsequently he was greatly honoured when, on the eve of his 88th birthday, he was invited to serve as 'Thundernator' for the 2005 Thunder Over Louisville fireworks show, the traditional pyrotechnic curtain-raiser to the Kentucky Derby. in 1975 he served as president of the Louisville Chamber of Commerce. He was a former chairman of the board of trustees of Bellarmine College (now University), from whom he received a law doctorate, and was a founding member of the Louisville Zoological Commission. He particularly supported the Louisville organisation Prodigal Ministries, which help men and women released from prison to re-establish themselves by starting a new life, devoid of crime.

Robbie's interest in coins began in the early 1960s. In 1964 he bought 16 different date U.S. large cents from a dealer in New Orleans, and that was the trigger to specialise in the series. Acquiring copies of Sheldon's *Penny Whimsy* and Newcomb's *United States Copper Cents 1816-1857*, and subsequently joining the fledgling Early American Coppers society, he set out to complete all the varieties and different die states of the entire span of years from 1793 to 1857. Only five others had previously managed it, including Sheldon himself, George Clapp, Ted Naftzger (whose collection was auctioned recently) and Denis Loring. But Robbie achieved the feat – twice! His first collection, catalogued into 1,456 lots by Jack Collins, with assistance from Del Bland, Walter Breen and others, was auctioned by Superior Galleries in West Hollywood on 30 September and 1 October 1986. Following that sale he immediately began assembling another collection using his duplicates which, minus the late dates, was completed in 1995; this went under the hammer in 683 lots with Superior in Beverly Hills on 27 January 1996. The later date business strikes, from 1840 to 1857, an extensive run, subsequently became the third Robinson S. Brown Jr collection to be auctioned by Superior on 2 June 2002, the 1,543-lot catalogue being the work of Bob Grellman and Stuart Rubenfeld.

Like some before him and many since, the basis for Robbie's introduction to 18th century British trade tokens as a collecting field lay with the contemporary American copper series. Fellow EAC member Myles Gerson (1925-86), of Flossmoor, Illinois, sold him a tranche of duplicates in April 1978 and now Robbie had two main spheres of interest. Gerson was a considerable source of supply in the early days as he upgraded his own collection, auctioned by Spink in 1986 and 1987 after Patrick Deane, Jim Noble and Jerry Bobbe had first pick in 1985. Jerry Bobbe, who purchased his first 'Conder' tokens in 1972 and was an early mentor of Gerson's in the series, moved to Portland, Oregon in 1978 and by the early 1980s had started to sell tokens to Robbie. Perusing this catalogue it will be obvious that many of the best tokens in the collection have come through Jerry's hands one way or another, because over nearly a quarter-century Jerry became Robbie's 'eyes and ears' in the market, especially latterly as Robbie's collection grew to a size on a par with that formed by Jim Noble. The Noble sale of 1998 provided many opportunities for Robbie, both at the auction and afterwards, with acqusitions from Jerry, from Allan Davisson and from Richard Gladdle. Apart from a few direct purchases at DNW auctions, Richard was Robbie's only direct UK contact; Robbie enjoyed a plentiful supply via the domestic market, from people like Phil Flanagan, who traded as Gothic Coins out of Akron, Ohio, and after 1985 under his own name from Coupeville, Washington; from the Hawaiian-based dealer Simon Cordova; from Denis Loring when he was based in New York; from Joel Spingarn, the Georgetown, Connecticut-based collector and co-founder of the Conder Token Collectors Club, whom Robbie had met at an EAC convention and introduced to the series; from CTCC founder Wayne Anderson (1941-99) in Maple Grove, Minnesota, and many others.

Whether it was collecting U.S. large cents or 18th century tokens, Robbie was always meticulous to note the provenance of every piece and his detailed records have been of immense help in compiling this catalogue. To my knowledge, he only wrote about his tokens on one occasion, as a contribution to the November 1996 edition of the *Conder Token Collectors Journal* (p.31). There he went on record as owning 3,120 pieces; that number was to rise to over 5,300 tokens, including several hundred duplicates, by the time of his death, at the age of 88, on 28 July 2005.

This auction, the third of four annual dispersals which began in 2009, features 1,151 different tokens and medals from the alphabetical English counties Norfolk to Yorkshire. There is much to commend to the specialist and general collector alike, with unique pieces from Shropshire, great rarities from the Warwickshire series and many other classic tokens within the following 385 lots. Part IV, in October 2012, concludes with tokens of Wales, Scotland, Ireland and several hundred duplicates. Robbie's U.S.-related tokens were sold in DNW's pre-Coinex auctions in 2009 and 2010.

Robbie was an inspiring role model, always demonstrating a tremendous commitment to honesty and integrity. With his quiet, unassuming demeanour, he was known for a wonderful sense of humour and a twinkle in his eye. His wife, Jean McCauley Brown, whom he met during the War and married in 1942, died in 2004; they leave five children, 14 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

In accordance with DNW house style, this collection has been catalogued by location rather than by denomination as in Dalton and Hamer; in this way pieces relative to each other and specific to a particular locality are easier to find. Tokens issued by named individuals are listed alphabetically, preceding those struck by manufacturers for specious gain. The opportunity has been taken to record the weight and die axis of each piece, information which might not only help pinpoint pieces from the collection in future years should original tickets and envelopes be discarded, but is also increasingly relevant to those who study the series in depth.

Appendix: Notes on the Tokens and their Issuers

579

Stephen Ashley, grocer.

580

The Blofield and South Walsham troop of the Yeomanry Cavalry of Norfolk, led by Capt James Burkin Burroughes (†1803, aged 43) of Burlingham Hall, was formed on 18 March 1795; between then and 1803 the troop averaged 60 men.

584-7

William Absolon (1751-1815), china and glass manufacturer, artist and dealer, fl. 1784-1815, at 25 Market row from 1790 (Howell, English Ceramic Circle Transactions, vol.10, 1980). Daniel Boulter (1740-1802), son of a Quaker butcher at Worsted, was apprenticed to his cousin, Joseph Sparshall, a grocer of Great Yarmouth; after failing to find work in London he returned to Yarmouth and married Margaret Sutton of Melton Constable in 1764. Boulter became a museum proprietor in the Market place in Great Yarmouth, opening to the public a show of items of 'natural and artificial curiosities' in 1778. These included paintings, prints, books, coins and medals and, most notably, items brought back from the South Sea islands by Capt Cook; a catalogue of the contents, entitled Museum Boulterianum, was published in 1793. In 1794 he disposed of his museum to his nephew John; Daniel, his brother Joseph and the nephew commissioned the token. During Daniel's last years he lived in a house in Howard street purchased in 1797 from Capt Samuel Barker, selling part of his coin collection by auction in London on 13 April 1799; the balance was auctioned post mortem in March 1808 (Brooke, CTCJ November 1997, pp.34-6).

590

Richard Bacon (1745-1812), bookseller, stationer, auctioneer and brandy merchant, 12 Cockey lane, proprietor of the *Norwich Mercury* (Longman, pp.54-5). Nathaniel Bolingbroke (1757-1840), haberdasher and silversmith, Market place, mayor in 1819, is buried in the churchyard of St Peter Mancroft, Norwich, as is his wife, Mary (1758-1833); his youngest son Horatio (1798-1879) became the first sheriff of Norwich in 1835 and Bolinbroke road in Norwich is named after him. Bullen & Martin, ironmongers, Market place.

591

Robert Campin, haberdasher, Goat lane. Joseph Clarke, hatter and hosier, 2 Gentleman's walk. Richard Dinmore, ironmonger and hemp merchant, Timber Hall, a staunch Republican and president of Norwich's Patriotic Society; his son, also Richard (1765-1811), was a Jacobin apologist who migrated to the USA, where he published poetry in Washington in 1802 – at the time of his death his father was still alive. Dunham & Yallop, goldsmiths and jewellers, haberdashers, cutlers, dealers in tea, coffee and chocolate (Saville, *SCMB* 1969, p.191), Market place, proprietors Robert Dunham (1762-1825), his wife Francis (1763-1816) and John Harrison Yallop (1763-1835), brother-inlaw of Nathaniel Bolingbroke, Yallop being sheriff of Norwich in 1805 and mayor in 1815 and 1831, the year he was knighted; all three are buried in the churchyard of St Peter Mancroft, Norwich.

592

Joseph Hardingham, musician, St Stephens, Norwich.

594

John Harvey (1755-1842), master weaver and philanthropist, partner in Harvey and Hudson (Norwich Bank, later Norwich Crown Bank), mayor 1792, commanding officer of the Norwich Volunteer Cavalry, lived at Thorpe Lodge, Norwich.

595

John Rooks, timber merchant and carpenter, Fishgate street.

596

Norwich Castle, a Norman edifice built in the early 12th century $\,$

in the centre of the city; the keep served as Norfolk's county prison from 1220 until 1887, when the castle was purchased by the city to be utilised as a museum. The bridge shown on the token was replaced in the 1820s.

598

Revd Daniel Collyer (†1819), parish priest at Wroxham from 1776 to 1801 and proprietor of a marle (carbonate of lime) pit at Horstead, had his marle transported by wherries via a specially excavated canal system. In 1798 he was instrumental in establishing a force of pikemen to defend Norfolk against the threat of invasion from France, but was himself prevented from joining them by the then archbishop of Canterbury (Saville, SCMB 1969, p.192). He died at Southwold.

599

'George Jobson', a fictitious character perhaps invented by the manufacturer Robert Morgan in the wake of the collapse of the Northampton & Northamptonshire Bank in 1793. The substantive issue (DH 1a) was struck some months earlier than DH 1 (Dykes, forthcoming).

600

Alnwick Castle, seat of the Duke of Northumberland; considerable restoration by the architect Robert Adam was carried out in the half-century before the token was struck.

601-3

William Mather, ironmonger and stove-grate manufacturer, 14 Dean street. The obverse of his token was designed by Thomas Bewick (1753-1828), the wood engraver and ornithologist from Cherryburn, near Newcastle.

604-7

Jeremiah Spence, seaman's clothier, allegedly a younger brother of Thomas Spence.

630-3

Robert Davison (1751-1807) and John Hawksley (†1815), both well-known Nottingham businessmen, built a factory for worsted spinning at Arnold, 4 miles from the centre of Nottingham, in 1791. They employed up to 400 adults and 600 apprentices and children, some of whom came from as far away as Doncaster; many of the children were overworked, badly fed and housed, which resulted in a high mortality rate. Owing to the depression the Arnold Mill closed in 1811, and was subsequently demolished (Chapman, 'Davison & Hawksley, Worsted Spinners 1787-1810', in Trans. Thoroton Soc., 2007; also Burton, BNJ 1923-4, pp.275-6, copied by Andrews, SCMB 1950, p.166). The Davison and Hawksley tokens were made in the summer of 1802 – the date they bear is that of the founding of the Arnold works - and the company paid Matthew Boulton for them in August 1802 (Doty, 1998, p.323 and CTCJ December 2000, pp.16-17).

634-6

Donald & Co, stocking manufacturers, also at 29 Bull street, Birmingham and later at 74 High street, proprietor William Donald, fl. 1792-c. 1815 (Manville p.199).

637

Newstead Abbey, located west of Ravenshead, midway between Nottingham and Mansfield, was founded by Henry II. After the dissolution it was converted into a house for Sir John Byron and his descendants, although the estate was ruined by William, 5th Lord Byron (1722-98). On his death the Abbey passed to his great-nephew, George Gordon (1788-1824), the poet who became the 6th Lord Byron. Between 1808 and his exile abroad Byron lived sporadically at the Abbey, which was sold in 1817 to Thomas Wildman, who restored it; the Abbey was gifted to Nottingham Corporation in 1931.

638

William Rusher († 1846, aged 90), bookseller and stationer, part of an extended family of that name active in the printing trade

in Oxfordshire and Berkshire in the late 18th and first half of the 19th centuries (Longman, pp.55-7). William, described as a schoolmaster when he married Mary Golby at Banbury in February 1783, began directory publishing in 1797 but had been active in printing since at least 1784, primarily with chap books; his brother, Philip, a banker and typographer, helped finance the business. William Rusher retired in 1822, leaving his business to his younger son Thomas; he in turn merged it with the firm being run by his elder brother, John Golby Rusher (†1877) at Market place in 1832 (Wager, *CTCJ* March 2000, pp.12-13).

639

Isaac Perrins (1750-1801), prize-fighter and engineer employed by Boulton & Watt. A giant of a man, 6ft 2in in bare feet and weighing 17 stone, he was the champion boxer of the Midlands with a reputation of beating his opponents in under five minutes. He issued a challenge of £500 to meet any man in the country, an offer which attracted the attention of Thomas Jackling, aka Johnson (†1797), the London and England champion since 1783. The match was made at Banbury on 22 October 1789 and, in a tournament of mixed fortune watched by 3,000 people, which lasted 75 minutes and comprised no less than 62 rounds, Johnson took victory and a large purse, reputed to be over £1,000. Perrins is said never to have fought again (Chaloner, History Today, 1973, pp.740-3); not so Johnson, whose patrons introduced him to racing and gambling. In January 1791 Johnson lost his title to Benjamin 'Big Ben' Brain at Wrotham, Kent; subsequently he dissipated his fortune gambling and ended his days teaching boxing in Cork.

640

Shirburn Castle, a fortified manor house built in 1378 2 miles north-east of Watlington, was turned into a grand house at great expense in the 17th century. Until the beginning of 2005 it was the seat of the Earls of Macclesfield, but it is now closed and unoccupied.

641

Sir Gerard Noel Edwards, later Noel, 2nd Bt (1759-1838) married Diana Middleton, Baroness Barham (†April 1823) in December 1780; they had 15 children, all of whom survived infancy, the last dying in January 1873. Noel inherited the estates of his uncle, Henry Noel, 6th Earl of Gainsborough, in April 1798, adopting the Noel surname, by which he had apparently been known for some years, by royal licence. He lived at Catmose, Oakham, and had established the Rutland Fencible Cavalry on 19 March 1794, which had a strength of six troops. The Fencibles were based in a warm ironstone building erected in 1794-5 on the site of former maltings opposite Noel's residence, which served as their indoor riding school. After the Fencibles disbanded in 1799 the local troop of the Leicestershire Yeomanry continued to use the facility until the 1920s. In 1967 the Noel family donated the building to Rutland County Council and since 1969 it has been the county museum.

644

Dudmaston Hall, 3 miles south-east of Bridgenorth, built in the late 17th century on land owned by the Wolryche-Whitmore family, was given to the National Trust in 1978. Among its most famous residents were the mathematician and 'father of computing' Charles Babbage (1791-1871), who married Georgiana Wolryche-Whitmore in 1814, and Rachel, Lady Labouchere (1908-96), a direct descendant of the Coalbrookdale industrialist Abraham Darby.

645-6

Reynolds & Co, trading as the Coalbrook-Dale Iron Co, proprietors Richard Reynolds (†September 1816, aged 81), his sons William (†June 1803, aged 45) and Joseph. The inclined plane at Ketley, completed in 1788 and the brainchild of William Reynolds, enabled his iron foundry at Ketley to use iron ore and coal from the mines at Oakengates, transported

direct to the foundry by canal; the Ketley works closed in 1816 and the inclined plane two years later. After the death of William, who lived at Bank House, Ketley, his father left Coalbrookdale for Bristol, where from 1804 to 1816 he carried out numerous acts of benevolence among the poor of that city.

647

Ludlow Castle, the seat of the Earls of Powis, was constructed in the late 11th century and enlarged for the use of Roger Mortimer, 1st Earl of March (1287-1330).

648-9

Salop Woollen Manufactory, a flannel mill located on the River Severn 3 miles upstream from Shrewsbury, proprietors White Cooke, Sons and Mason (Dykes, *BNJ* 1999, p.179). The partnership was dissolved in 1798 and succeeded by that of Holt and Mason; the mill was sold after the death of Edward Holt in 1824.

651-662

John Wilkinson (1728-1808), arguably the best known of the 18th century ironmasters, grew up in Cumbria but at the age of 20 moved to Bradley, near Bilston, to work in the iron trade. In the mid 1750s he became manager of the Willey ironworks on Lord Forester's estate, near Broseley, and later senior partner; in 1758 he built his first blast furnace at Bradley, which became such a success that by 1772 he had purchased the local manor and estate. He issued promissory notes to pay his outworkers in 1773-4 and, later in the early 1790s, countersigned French assignats for use as currency substitutes (Manville, 2009, p.313, and Dykes, forthcoming). In 1774 he constructed the New Willey ironworks, where he built the world's first large iron barge, The Trial, which was launched on 6 July 1787. Wilkinson's vast business empire also encompassed an iron mine and blast furnaces at Snedshill, near Oakengates, sold in 1793-4 and an ironworks at Bersham in the parish of Wrexham, Denbighshire, which he took over from his father Isaac in 1762 and where cannons and the cylinders required for Watt's rotating steam engine were produced.

663-6

It is uncertain from the legend on the token whether William Glover's hardware business based at 39 Milsom street reflects a connection between the issuer and the Bath & Somersetshire Bank, the known proprietors of which were Horlock, Mortimer & Co (later Horlock Anderdon & Co), or whether, as seems more likely, that Glover took the property over after the bank failed in 1794 (Outing, p.33). Ironically, 39 Milsom street is now occupied by a branch of the National Westminster Bank. William Gye (1750-1802), bookseller, printer and stationer, 4 Westgate buildings and later at 13 Market place, agent to the debtors at Ilchester gaol; after his death from an apoplectic fit his widow Mary, née Batchelor, and a son, Henry, carried on the business (Longman, pp.58-9).

667

Francis Heath, ironmonger, brazier and cutler, 15 Bath street, and from 1799 at 2 Bath street, opposite Mary Lambe & Son (see lots 668-71); he was declared bankrupt at the end of 1800 and his stock auctioned in Bath in January 1801, but by 1805 he was back in business at 15 Stall street (Griffin, SCMB, 1958, pp.107-8, and Pottinger, Coin News, July 2005, p.44). The Walcot Turnpike is discussed by Brooke (CTCJ Winter 2001, pp.30-1). John Jelly (†1813), lawyer, Gay's place, proprietor of the Walcot Botanic Garden, opened in June 1793 with the help of the apothecary and botanist William Sole (1741-1802); Jelly was declared bankrupt in April 1795 and his property, including the garden, sold by auction (Brooke, CTCJ December 1999, pp.33-5). He was also co-issuer of the Badminton halfpence (Brown Part I, lot 142).

668-71

Mary Lambe & Son, grocers and tea dealers, 36 Stall street (later merged with 1 Bath street in 1799); Mary was the widow of Lacon Lambe (†1775); her sons were Lacon Lander Lambe

(b. 1774) and Markes Lambe, the latter a numismatist and a presumed customer of Lutwyche, who auctioned his collection of tokens and medals with the London house of Thomas King Jr on 27 December 1800 (Griffin, *SCMB* 1959, pp.214-15).

672

James Wood, linen draper, Abbey yard.

675

The Bath Association, a troop of men under the command of Capt John Wiltshire, was raised on 26 April 1798.

676

Bath Abbey dates from the 8th century and was wrested from the bishop of Worcester by King Offa, who had the edifice rebuilt; in the later Middle Ages it was in a parlous state and not restored to its former health until the 17th century. The present Guildhall, the work of the architect Thomas Baldwin, was built in 1776 and houses one of the finest Adam-style interiors in England. There is no record of the King visiting Bath on 10 September 1789, the date shown on the fourth item.

677-8

James Holloway & Son, tailors and drapers, proprietors of the town's post office.

679

Sparks & Gidley, linen and woollen manufacturers, proprietors Samuel Sparks and Bartholomew Gidley. The Somerset Yeomanry Cavalry was formed of two corps, the West Somerset Yeomanry, established at Milverton on 25 July 1794 and the East Somerset Yeomanry at Castle Cary in May 1794.

680

John Moggridge (c. 1720-1803) and Thomas Joyce (1759-1817), erected the purpose-built Dunkirk mill, intended predominantly for the mechanical spinning of yarn, in the early 1790s. Joyce later leased Freshford mill and by 1810 was the parish's largest landowner and employer, but in 1813 he acquired the Staverton factory and disposed of his interests at Freshford (Dykes, *BNJ* 2004, pp.190-7).

681

Glastonbury Abbey, believed to have been the first Christian church in Britain, was at one time second only to Westminster in importance.

683

In the late 18th century Leek had an extensive silk and textile industry employing some 2,000 people in the town and 1,000 from nearby villages. A staple part of this industry was button-making and Phillips and Ford was one such company of button-makers; it is equally likely that the town's two principal silk dyeing businesses in Mill street, one run by the Badnall family which had been established by William Badnall (†1760), the other by Thomas Ball, could have had a hand in the token circulation.

684-6

Samuel Barker, son of John Barker, banker and nail manufacturer, was a partner in the family firm of Barker & Co, bankers, Greenhill, taken over by John Barker Scott in 1803 (Outing, p.190); he was also the junior bailiff of Lichfield and dozener, or dean, of the city's Sadlers street ward. On Whit Monday the bailiffs held an annual court at the Lichfield Guildhall, following which an open-air ceremony was held at Greenhill. For further details see Bell, 1966, pp.139-40.

687

Richard Wright, numismatist and antiquarian, acquired a portion of the private museum formed by his grandfather, Richard Greene (1716-93), an eccentric Lichfield apothecary and surgeon, in 1800. The contents of the museum, which included artefacts donated by Samuel Johnson and Matthew Boulton, were auctioned on behalf of Wright by Mr Harris in London in August 1821 (Brooke, *CTCJ* March 1998, pp.21-4).

689-90

William Horton & Co, boot and shoe manufacturers.

691

Revd Francis Blick, BA, MA (1754-1842), son of Francis Blick of Coventry, educated at St John's College Oxford, vicar and curate of St Editha, Tamworth, was appointed rural dean of Lichfield in August 1837. A numismatist who lived at Bonehill, Tamworth, introduced to the pursuit by John Harding, his coin collection and library were auctioned by Sotheby's *post mortem* in June and July 1843.

692-3

John Harding, calico printer and partner in the Tamworth Old Bank, proprietors Harding, Oakes & Willington, which failed in 1819. A neighbour of Francis Blick at Bonehill, his collection of tokens was purchased by Sir George Chetwynd.

695-6

Thomas Bevan, wine and spirit merchant. His tokens were probably produced c. 1797-8 (Dykes, forthcoming).

697-700

Sir John Rous, 6th Bt, 1st Earl of Stradbroke (1750-1827), father-in-law of Vice-Admiral Sir Henry Hotham, GCMG, KCB (1777-1833), succeeded to the family estate at Henham Hall in 1771, but the building was destroyed by fire in 1773 and not rebuilt until the early 1790s; it remains a possibility that, even though they bear no promise of redemption, the tokens were used to help pay the large workforce engaged on the rebuild, which cost over £20,000 and was supervised by Rufus Marsden, the clerk of works. The Rous family finally moved back into the house in 1796. Rous was commanding officer of the first troop of the Loyal Suffolk Yeomanry Cavalry, raised at Blything in 1794. A mezzotint portrait of him, executed in 1811 by Sir William Beechey, is in the collection of the National Portrait Gallery.

701

Thomas Miller (1731-1804), b. Norwich, bookseller and coin collector (Longman, pp.59-61); his son, William (1769-1844) was one of London's best-known publishers between 1790 and 1805, based at Old Bond street and later Albemarle street. Because the dies broke after so few specimens had been struck Miller prized them highly, initially selling examples for 18s. each, but the price had gone up to two and a half guineas by 1797.

702-3

Samuel Prentice, grocer and chandler, collector of coins. Samuel Delf, whitesmith and brazier. Mathias Abel Sr, grocer and draper. N. Todd, merchant.

704

Bungay Castle was the seat of the Bigod family, but following a siege in 1173 the main building was confiscated and dismantled by the King's forces; what remains are the twin buttresses more accurately rendered on the tokens of Samuel Prentice.

705-6

Michael Apsey, ironmonger, tinman and brazier, Butter market. Philip Deck (†April 1804), bookseller and postmaster, Crown street (Longman pp.61-3). James Goer, ironmonger, also in business in Ipswich, still alive in 1823. Charles Guest, auctioneer, Hatter street. John Rackham (†1821, aged 64), bookseller and printer in business in Bury for 'nearly 43 years' with a circulating library at Angel hill, related by marriage to Richard Leatherdale (†1806), grocer and postmaster at Harleston (Longman pp.63-4).

707

John Fincham, weaver.

710-18

James Conder (1761-1823), linen draper and avid token collector, Tavern street, author of *An Arrangement of Provincial Coins, Tokens and Medalets issued in Great Britain, Ireland and the Colonies*, the first edition of which appeared in 1798; his vast collection of tokens was sold by his son at Sotheby's in June 1855. The JMC cypher on the 1797 pennies includes the initial of Conder's wife, Mary Foster, née Notcutt

(†1836 at Wymondham, Norfolk), whom he married on 1 January 1790; the couple had six children. Robert Manning, surveyor of windows.

719

Richard Powles (1763-1807), a local artist who followed a mercantile career in London; the token may have been issued by an anonymous group of local tradesmen (Dykes, forthcoming). Goldsmith & Sons, tailors and drapers. Robert Loder (†1811), printer, bookseller and stationer, author of *Statutes and Ordinances of Sekford's Almshouses*. Thomas Sekford (1516-88), of Sekford Hall, built the sessions house at Woodbridge and funded a series of maps of the counties of England and Wales, published in the 1570s (Longman, pp.65-6). Lutwyche's dies survived with the Loder family and in 1883 the issuer's grandson had seven impressions in silver struck before presenting the dies to the British Museum (Fisher, *CTCJ* Spring 2007, p.9).

720-2

Thomas Keys (1722-1800), b. Gloucester, a self-taught artist, bought the Waterman's Arms and four acres of land in Bermondsey in 1766, which he laid out as a tea-garden and named it the Bermondsey Spa Garden; subsequently he hosted musical concerts and erected a picture gallery and museum on the site. After Keys' death the popularity of the Garden declined and by 1806 it had closed.

724

Daniel Garraway, tea dealer.

725

Addington Place, once the country seat of the Archbishops of Canterbury, is now a corporate hospitality venue.

726

Dulwich College, an independent public school, was founded in 1619 by Edward Alleyn, an actor and contemporary of William Shakespeare. The original school, now the chapel, is shown on the token; the present-day school was built in 1857.

727

Guildford Castle was founded in Saxon times, rebuilt after the Norman conquest and captured by the Dauphin in 1216. Only the Norman keep and castle arch remain.

730-2

'Sir' Jeffery Dunstan (†March 1797), a travelling wig-seller 'of grotesque appearance' was elected mayor of Garrat Green, a district between Wandsworth and Lambeth, in 1781, 1785 and 1790; he was imprisoned for sedition in 1793 (Gladdle, *CTCJ* February 1997, pp.26-7).

733-8

'Sir' George Cook, merchant, Stangate, Lambeth, was one of the two elected mayors of Garrat on 24 August 1796 (Gladdle, *CTCJ* February 1997, pp.26-8).

739-40

Lambeth Palace, seat of the Archbishop of Canterbury.

742

William David Murray, Viscount Stormont and 3rd Earl of Mansfield (1777-1840). For the obverse design Jacobs copied the print published in *New and Complete English Traveller*, c. 1784.

743-4

Clandon Place was built in 1731 for Thomas, 2nd Baron Onslow (1679-1740).

745-6

Battle Abbey, dedicated to St Martin, was founded and endowed by William the Conqueror in 1067. It was transformed in the 14th century and after dissolution in 1539 the Crown granted the estate to Sir Anthony Brown, who demolished the church and used the materials to build a grand mansion, which is now Battle Abbey school.

747

Benjamin Deverell, orange merchant, Fleet Market, London (Dykes, BNJ 2007, p.252). William Mighell, grocer and

earthenware dealer. The first Brighton camp, a tented military enclosure at Belle Vue Field, was established in August 1793; two other camps were established in subsequent years.

752-3

John Chaldecott, silversmith and cutler, partner in the Chichester Old Bank and the Portsmouth, Portsea & Hampshire Bank. Thomas Sharp, mercer [Brown Part I, 182-4]. Dally & Son, proprietor Richard Dally; Thomas Dally, draper and Quaker, married Grace Spencer in 1789.

754

Frederick George Fisher, postmaster, Brighton and proprietor of two circulating libraries at Brighton and Eastbourne, the former established in 1784 and the latter in 1790. Declared bankrupt at Brighton in December 1803, his stock of books there was sold in 1805 (Brooke, *CTCJ* September 1998, pp.22-3), but the Eastbourne business remained in family hands until acquired by Robert Heatherly in 1815 (Dykes, forthcoming). John Hicks Boorman, grocer and draper, freemason. James Tebay, ironmonger and auctioneer, wife's name Jane; a memorial stone to his son James (†May 1791) is in St Clement's church, Hastings. Tebay's tokens are catalogued following the original DH plate enumeration.

763

Richard Maplesden, grocer and draper.

76

G. Bennett, grocer; untraced by Vidler (BNJ 1934-7, pp.253-4). $\bf 766$

John Allin, tailor, proprietor of the York shoe warehouse, Haymarket, and of Allin's Panorama, located at the corner of Congreve and Ann streets. Pye states that examples of DH 71a were the first tokens struck with an evasive edge reading to avoid redemption. James Bisset (1761-1832), b. Perth, freemason, painter of miniatures and portraits, Caroline street, proprietor of a museum and picture warehouse at New street, occasional writer, publisher and poet, the last survivor of the Minerva Club, a Birmingham political gathering, wife's name Dorothy; he removed to Leamington Priors in 1813 where he opened a gallery in Clemens street and a museum in Upper Union street (Longman pp. 68-70 and Brooke, *CTCJ* August 1997, pp.42-5).

767-72

George Hollington Barker, FSA (1735-1802), lawyer and coin collector, 7 The Square, father of George Barker; his coin collection was auctioned at Sotheby's in May 1803.

773-8

George Barker, FRS (1776-1845), lawyer and coin collector, Newhall street, benefactor to the city of Birmingham and proponent of the London and Birmingham Railway, son of George Hollington Barker. The token was attested by Barker to be the work of the 9-year old child prodigy John Gregory Hancock Jr (b. 24 June 1791, baptised January 1792), who presumably died young (Dykes, *BNJ* 1999, p.186).

779-81

The Birmingham Mining & Copper Co, which had mining and smelting businesses in Redruth and Swansea, was established with a share capital of £50,000 in August 1790; its offices were in Newhall street and one of the principal shareholders was Matthew Boulton.

783

John Clarke, chemist, druggist and general dealer, Bull street. 784

Donald & Co, stocking manufacturers, 29 Bull street and later at 74 High street, proprietor William Donald, fl. 1792-c. 1815 (Manville p.199). Joseph Farror (†by 1818), tea dealer, Temple street and 38 Bull ring, agent for the Phoenix Fire Insurance Office, Lombard street, London and, by 1795, in partnership with Mr W. Goode, 11 New street, as an auctioneer; Pye's 1801 attribution of DH 45-9 to Farror has been questioned (Dykes, forthcoming).

785

John Freeth (1731-1808), the 'Birmingham poet', proprietor of Freeth's Coffee House, Bell street, and publisher of *The Political Songster* (Longman p.71).

786

Samuel Garbett (1717-1803), entrepreneur, political lobbyist and coinage reformer, chairman of the Birmingham Commercial Committee, was a close friend of Matthew Boulton and at the centre of plans for a new national copper coinage in 1787-8. His attitude to tokens was somewhat guarded and it is generally thought that he rejected the trials made for him by J.G. Hancock in the late 1790s (Dykes, *BNJ* 1999, p.177; Dykes, *SNC* June 2005, pp.169-72, August 2005, p.246, and forthcoming).

787-91

William Hallan, dealer in china and Staffordshire ware, 2 Bull ring, also ran a 'registry office' or employment exchange for servants.

792-5

Assumed to be the work of the 9-year old child prodigy John Gregory Hancock Jr (b. 24 June 1791, baptised January 1792), who presumably died young (Dykes, *BNJ* 1999, p.186).

796

Henry Hickman, iron dealer, 3 Edgbaston street, recorded as a die-sinker and toolmaker in Wrightson's triennial Birmingham directory, 1818. The Hickman farthing DH 481 is the only 18th century farthing token type to bear a lettered edge and is rarer than the standard reference suggests; conversely, the Hickman halfpenny with the single buttonhole, probably the result of a filled die rather than a die which was altered later, is very much more common than DH state (Welch, *CTCJ* Fall 2001, p.11).

797

Benjamin Jacob, auctioneer, ironmonger and engraver, Bull street, near Welch Cross.

798

Peter Kempson (1755-1824), buttonmaker, St Mary's row and, by 1795, in Little Charles street, a prolific manufacturer of trade tokens for some 49 customers (Dykes, forthcoming). The initials $_{JK}$ on the second token may refer to James Kempson, the issuer's father (Hawkins, p.35).

799

William Lutwyche (1754-c. 1801), a toymaker by trade at Temple row and later at St Philip's churchyard, was responsible for coining a huge variety of trade tokens, and many imitations, for as many as 68 different customers between 1792 and 1798 – more than any other token manufacturer. His halfpenny tokens bear a wheel-operated fly press, his farthings a capstan press; the dies for them were engraved by Noël-Alexandre Ponthon (Dykes, *BNJ* 2004, pp. 168-72).

800

Joseph Priestley (1733-1804), dissenting minister and theologian, married Mary (†1794), daughter of the ironmaster John Wilkinson, in 1762. His interest in the burgeoning sciences of the time led him to an introduction to Benjamin Franklin in 1766, who encouraged Priestley to write his History of Electricity. In the early 1770s he isolated dephlogisticated air (what we know as oxygen). In 1780 he moved to Fairhill, Birmingham and joined the Lunar Society, a body of gifted individuals including Boulton, Watt, Wedgwood, Herschell, Franklin and Wilkinson, his father-in-law. However, his radical views and membership of the Constitutional Society of Birmingham, whose members advocated the principles of the French Revolution, led indirectly to the Birmingham riots of July 1791 when a crowd of reactionaries from the rival King and Country Society sacked the homes of Constitutional members, destroying virtually all of Priestley's life's work. For his own safety he left Birmingham and took a preaching post at the Gravel Pit chapel, Hackney, in December 1791, but in April 1794 he and his wife emigrated to the USA, where they settled

at Northumberland, Pennsylvania and Priestley became a confidante of Thomas Jefferson.

801

Charles Pye (1749-1830), engraver, directory publisher and token collector, author of Provincial Copper Coins or Tokens issued between the Years 1787 and 1796, later expanded into a second edition published in 1801 and in which he was assisted with the engravings by his son John (1782-1874). Outside the field of numismatics he is best known for his Dictionary of Ancient Geography, 1805, his A Description of Modern Birmingham, 1819, later republished in 1825 as The Stranger's Guide to Modern Birmingham, with an account of its Public Buildings and Institutions, its Show Rooms and Manufactories. For his directories, the first of which appeared in 1787, Pye personally canvassed the area and included people free of charge; his 1797 edition had 81 pages. In 1800 he asked people to send in their names plus sixpence to be included in the directory, which was a disaster; that year's directory contained only 12 pages of names (Longman, pp.72-3, and DNB).

802

James Sketchley (†Poughkeepsie, USA, 1801), freemason, printer, publisher and auctioneer, 61 High street, who issued the first Birmingham Directory in 1763 and published the Warwick and Coventry Magazine, later the Coventry and Birmingham Magazine (Longman pp.73-5). He also had business interests in Bristol and Bath (Dykes, forthcoming). 803-7

Thomas Welch (1774-1814), lawyer, known to all the token manufacturers, formed the best contemporary collection of tokens which was auctioned by Thomas King Jr in London in September 1801, shortly after the publication of the second edition of Pye's work, for which Welch supplied much information. The Warwickshire Yeomanry Cavalry was founded by the Earl of Warwick on 25 June 1794 and comprised four troops; the first commanding officer was Heneage Finch, 4th Earl of Aylesford (1751-1812). The legend on the token would infer that Welch was associated with the second troop, but all four troops had combined to form a regiment in 1797. Thomas Wyon Sr (1767-1830), die and seal engraver, 2 Temple street and later at Lionel street in partnership with his twin brother Peter (1767-1822) until 1800. Thomas then moved to London where he was in business at 20 John street, Southwark, then from 1818 successively at Regent street, Vauxhall walk, Lambeth and Nassau street, Soho [now Gerrard place]. He was appointed chief engraver of the King's Seals in 1816 (Hawkins pp.113-14).

808-12

The Birmingham Workhouse, Lichfield street, was erected in 1733 and enlarged and extended in 1766 and 1779; it was demolished in 1853. Although the large value tokens, attributed to the manufacturer Gimblett, have always been ascribed to the Workhouse on account of the BWH cypher they bear, Mays (1991, pp.125-7) refers to an advertisement published in the Birmingham Gazette, 17 August 1812, relating to the circulation of false Workhouse silver halfcrowns, in which the overseers "inform the public that they have never issued Tokens of 2s. 6d. nor any of a higher value than 1s", the inference being that the 1788 coins, issued a generation earlier, were but a distant memory. James Alston, buttonmaker, 22 Church street (Hawkins, pp.109, 112); it seems likely that Alston may also have been responsible for the value-expressed tokens (DH 3-5) which probably appeared c. 1799. The New Union Mill, Holloway head, opened in 1796, is now owned by Birmingham city council and used by the Birmingham Art Trust.

835-7

These medals were advertised for sale in Aris's Birmingham Gazette on 4 August 1783 (Dykes, BNJ 1999, p.176).

838

Members of the Society discussed social, moral, and political questions; it was still functioning in 1792, when the magistrates interfered on the grounds that the previous year's riots should discourage public discussion of dangerous subjects. For more details on Demosthenes see Bartlett, *CTCJ* Spring 2003, pp.24-

839

The series of riots in Birmingham, which began on the evening of 14 July 1791 and lasted three days, resulted in the destruction of a vast amount of valuable property and was only halted by the actions of the militia brought in from Nottingham. In a subsequent series of trials at Warwick and Worcester, four of the ringleaders were hanged.

840

The colours were presented to the Loyal Birmingham Light Horse Volunteers and the Birmingham Loyal Association on Birmingham Heath on 4 June 1798, in the presence of a crowd of over 50,000 (Dykes, *BNJ* 2001, pp.133-5). Doubt has been expressed as to whether Jorden had the capacity to strike the medal and it is thought that Hancock, as engraver, and Kempson, as manufacturer, might have been responsible for it (Dykes, forthcoming).

841-2

These medals, struck in Birmingham by Peter Kempson, probably in the late summer of 1800, reflect the inordinately high prices for wheat occasioned by the poor harvests of 1799 and, particularly, 1800, coupled with a perception that certain individuals were undermining the corn trade at the time. There was rioting and disorder on several occasions in Birmingham (Dykes, *SNC* October 2005, pp.309-12).

843-4

John Nickson (1760-1830), leather manufacturer, senior partner in Nickson and Townsend. An antiquarian with an interest in numismatics, Nickson was a friend of Thomas Sharp (see lots 851-2) and in 1791 assisted in the founding of Coventry library. The original Coventry Free School, now known as the King Henry VIII School, was founded by John Hales (†December 1571) on 23 July 1545.

845-8

Edmund Percy († c. 1840), lawyer, who later removed to 4 Church street Leamington, where he was clerk to the magistrates. Dr Philemon Holland (1552-1637), b. Chelmsford, took a degree in medicine at Cambridge and moved to Coventry around 1595, where he practised among the poor but devoted most of his energy to translating. In 1628 he was made headmaster of the local free school, but he served for less than a year. His last years were passed in poverty, though he was awarded a pension in 1635 by the city council of Coventry.

849-50

Robert Reynolds & Co, ribbon weavers. Waters (1954, p.32) opined that DH 252 was 'now unknown', but several specimens are extant.

851-2

Thomas Sharp (1770-1841), b. Leamington Spa, hatter, antiquarian and numismatist, Little Park street, author of the Chetwynd catalogue of tokens published in 1834; Sharp had collected coins from his youth, building up a cabinet of tokens, much of which was absorbed into the Chetwynd holdings. The Georgian house where Sharp was born is said to have been the same building from which the Peeping Tom watched Lady Godiva ride naked through the streets of Coventry; the man leaning from the window on the token is supposed to represent the Peeping Tom. Sharp was a proponent of the Kempson series of Coventry tokens also dated 1797. Sharp retired from his retail business in 1804 and devoted himself to antiquarian research (Dykes, *BNJ* 2001, pp.130-2, and forthcoming).

861

St Michael's dated to the 15th century; its spire, over 300 feet

high, was one of the finest in Europe. At the beginning of the 20th century it was the largest parish church in England. Designated a Cathedral after a revision of the diocese in 1918, it was famously bombed virtually to destruction in a Luftwaffe raid on 14 November 1940 and only the roofless shell remains today.

864

Proof of the attribution of this token to Warwickshire is as yet lacking (Dykes, *BNJ* 2001, p.130, and forthcoming).

865

Placed to Nuneaton by Conder and successive authors, although in reality this token has nothing to do with the town (Waters, 1954, p.32).

871-5

On 31 May 1797 a meeting was held at Warwick racecourse to promote a petition to the King to secure the dismissal of his ministers. The proposer of it was Bertie Greatheed, the county sheriff, a devotee of the Whig party and an ardent admirer of the earlier stages of the French revolution. The three people depicted in the cart are Dr Samuel Parr (1747-1825), curate of Hatton, the Revd J.H. Williams, vicar of Wellesbourne, and Greatheed himself.

881

Kendal Castle, which dates to Norman times, was last occupied by the Parr family, of whom Catherine was to become the sixth and last wife of Henry VIII. A ruin for the last 400 years, the land was bought by the corporation of Kendal in 1897 as part of the town's celebrations for Queen Victoria'a diamond jubilee year.

882

John Baster, tanner, breeches and glove manufacturer.

883

David Arnot, proprietor of the Spa House, Holt, near Bradfordon-Avon, opened a school for boys in September 1794. The tokens state that the mineral spa for which the town was once well known was discovered in 1688; Holt's medicinal waters were also sold by his London agent, John Griffiths, 27 St Alban's street [now Waterloo place].

885

John Thurston Sharpe and Thomas Sharpe, grocers and tea dealers.

891

About 650 struck for Markes Lambe, the Bath trader and numismatist, but very few of DH 1a. On 4 June 1794, at a meeting at the Bear Hotel in Devizes, the decision was taken to create bodies of yeomanry cavalry throughout Wiltshire; the first troop, of 56 yeomen, had already been formed at Bishops Cannings on 12 May. Initially consisting of ten troops acting independently and mustered over the following 12 months, they combined to form a single regiment, the Wiltshire Yeomanry Cavalry, on 15 April 1797. It is suggested that these tokens were struck at about that time. Command of the new body was given Sir Charles Brudenell-Bruce, 1st Marquess of Ailesbury (1773-1856), the captain of the Marlborough troop and MP for the borough from 1796 to 1814. In June 1798 all ten troops paraded for the first time at Devizes and marched to Beckhampton Down, where Lady Bruce presented five standards; the regiment then comprised 28 officers and 595 NCOs, a total figure not unadjacent to the numbers of tokens struck, whether by accident or design.

892-6

Edward Davies, nail factor. Dudley Priory dates to the late 12th century and is now a preserved ruin in the care of Dudley Metropolitan Borough Council. Dudley Castle is a ruin with origins said to date to the 8th century. A royalist garrison was besieged there in the Civil War and severe damage was done to the infrastructure by a major fire which started on 24 July 1750 and burned for two days; the fire was caused by coin counterfeiters working in the dungeons.

904

Struck to mark the return of the issuer as MP for Evesham at the election in June 1796. Thomas Thompson (1767-1818), like his fellow MP Robert Biddulph who represented Herefordshire (Spence Part I, 1285-8), was a radical Whig. Along with the Tory Sir John Rushout, Bt (†October 1800, aged 62), Thompson had also been returned for Evesham in the previous election in 1790, when he polled 407 votes. Thompson, the bastard son of the token collector Mr Levi, of 39 Piccadilly, London, was also a token collector himself.

905-7

Hagley Hall and Park, largely the creation of George, 1st Lord Lyttelton (1709-73), secretary to Frederick, Prince of Wales. The Park, landscaped in the 1740s and 1750s, featured the very latest in arboricultural thinking, which captured the minds of the likes of Horace Walpole and the Scottish poet James Thomson (1700-48), who wrote "I am most charmed...particularly with a winding dale...enlivened by a stream that now gushing from mossy rocks, now falling in cascades, and now spreading into a calm length of water, forms the most natural and pleasing scene imaginable."

915

Tony Fox has demonstrated that this token is of Leigh, Worcestershire, not Leigh-on-Sea, Essex (*CTCJ* Spring 2005, pp.14-17).

916

St Michael's church, South street, Brierley Hill, erected c. 1767. 917

These medalets commemorate the visit by the King to Worcester from August 6-8 1788, when the annual Three Choirs meeting, the oldest music festival in the world, triennially rotated between Worcester, Gloucester and Hereford and traditionally held towards the end of August each year, was moved to accommodate him and his wish for his own band to accompany the musicians.

927

Bowes Castle, built by Alan, Earl of Richmond in the late 11th century on the site of the old Roman station of Lavatrae, was a ruin within 200 years and the remains are now listed.

928

Guisborough Priory was founded in the 12th century by the ancestors of Robert the Bruce. For generations it was their favourite place of burial and, somewhere under the neatly manicured lawns, lie the remains of the Scottish King's father and other relatives.

929

John Downing, grocer and tea dealer. Jonathan Garton, linen draper, Market place and trustee of Holy Trinity church (Whitting, 1969, p.33).

930-3

Samuel Birchall (1761-1814), Quaker, antiquarian and publisher of *A Descriptive list of the Provincial Copper Coins or Tokens issued between...1786 and 1796*. He formed collections of coins and tokens, stuffed birds and beasts, and minerals; a portion of his collection of coins and tokens was sold by Puttick & Simpson in July 1869.

934-5

Henry Brownbill, watchmaker and silversmith, 19-20 Briggate, succeeded by his son Thomas. The true progenitor of the Brownbill tokens was Samuel Birchall, who first contacted Matthew Boulton in December 1792. The order was remitted quickly, with specimens that were presumably bronzed sent to Leeds in February 1793, followed by the bulk of the tokens in two batches despatched in March (Doty, *CTCJ* June 1998, pp. 26-9).

936

Richard Paley (1746-1808), maltster, soap boiler and speculative property developer of high-density working-class housing in the east-end of Leeds, who played an important role

in the early history of the West Riding of Yorkshire; declared bankrupt in May 1803 (Dykes, *BNJ* 2004, p.197, and forthcoming). For a discussion on DH 53, see Doty, *CTCJ* March 1999, pp.26-9.

937

Bolton Castle was built in the late 14th century by Richard le Scrope, 1st Lord Scrope of Bolton. A massive fortress with walls 9 feet thick, Mary Queen of Scots was imprisoned there in 1568-9 and a party of Royalists was starved into submission over a period of 15 months during the Civil War. For much of the 18th century it was a ruin, eventually inherited though marriage by Thomas Orde-Powlett (1746-1807), who was created Baron Bolton of Bolton Castle on 20 October 1797.

938

Edmund Burke (1729-97), Anglo-Irish statesman, author and orator, successively Whig MP for Wendover, Bristol and Malton, 1765-94, a vocal supporter of American independence.

939

The abbey of Rievaulx, the first Cistercian outpost in the North, was established in 1132 but has been unoccupied since the Dissolution.

940

Fountains Abbey, a Cistercian monastery founded in 1132, was sold after the Dissolution to Sir Richard Gresham. It was then resold by a descendant, William Gresham of Itwood, to Stephen Proctor who was responsible for building Fountains Hall with some of the stone from the abbey. The building passed through several hands until 1768 when it was purchased by William Aislabie (†1781, aged 81) who set about preserving what had remained. Today it is administered by the National Trust.

941

942-8

The Sheffield Constitutional Society was founded at the end of 1791 by Joseph Gales (1761-1841). Gales, born at Eckington, Derbyshire, was a printer by trade who moved to Sheffield in 1784. He met Thomas Paine who urged him to start publishing his own radical newspaper, and the first edition of the Sheffield Register appeared in June 1787. This successful paper combined a fresh outlook on local matters with lively political comment penned by Gales, and by May 1794 was selling 2,000 copies a week. Through his media contacts Gales was recruited to serve on the committee of the London Corresponding Society, while back in Sheffield he had organised a petition in support of universal suffrage, which 8,000 inhabitants of the city signed. His activities were brought to the attention of William Pitt, whose government was distrustful of the radical movement in Sheffield and had moved to start arresting members of the various corresponding societies. Charged with conspiracy, Gales fled to Germany in June 1794. He subsequently emigrated to the USA, settling in Philadelphia where he edited the Independent Gazetteer, then moving to Raleigh, NC in October 1799 to begin the Raleigh Register.

From medieval times Yarm was the most important town and port on the River Tees, but there is no evidence that it ever had a castle.
