

# TOKENS FROM THE LATE DAVID GRIFFITHS COLLECTION (Part IV)

The fourth part of the extensive collection of British tokens formed by the late David Griffiths (1940-2011) comprises 17th century issues from three of his secondary-interest counties: Lincolnshire (238 different, plus 6 dieduplicates), Rutland (12 different and one dieduplicate another seven pieces recorded as being in the collection were evidently dispersed before 2011) and Shropshire (66 different).

Apart from the usual references, the opportunity has been taken to link the Lincolnshire pieces to a new county study by the cataloguer, currently in preparation. The cataloguer would also like to acknowledge the assistance of Tim Scotney, who kindly made available his research on the Lincolnshire issuers taken from documents and other contemporary records.

## George Berry (1928-2013)

eorge Berry was born in Oldham, Lancashire, on 18 October 1928, the younger of two sons of George Ingham Berry, a Congregational church minister who had seen service in the trenches in World War I, and his wife Ethel, née Gill, a schoolteacher. In 1933 the family moved to the Liverpool suburb of Seaforth, where he recalled that his school was bombed in early 1940 and lessons took place in the teacher's house for a select few for 18 months! In 1941 there was another move to Goosnargh, near Preston, from where George completed his education at Preston Grammar School and then enrolled as a trainee teacher at the City of Leeds Training College in 1946. His first teaching experience was at St Leonard's, Padiham, at the age of 19, before national service with the Royal Scots intervened and he spent 1949 and 1950 as a sergeant instructor with the R.A.E.C. in Trieste, Italy, where he

later recalled he was almost court-martialled for insubordination.

Demobbed, further teaching posts followed, at Cradley Heath and Halesowen. At the latter he made the acquaintance of the late Peter Selby, like himself a teacher and coin collector, and it was at Halesowen that he was appointed to his first deputy headship in 1958. He served as president of the local branch of the National Union of Teachers and read for his B.A. degree, submitting a paper on the debasement of Tudor coinage. In 1961 he moved to Buckinghamshire with his first appointment as Head Master, at the county's last all-age school in the village of Waddesdon, where he recalled that he was interviewed for the post by none other than Lady Rothschild. Two years later he moved to Holtspur, just outside Beaconsfield, upon his appointment as Head at Gravel Hill school in Chalfont St Peter, where he made the acquaintance of, among many other local celebrities, Roald Dahl. It was a time of increasing freedom in education and in this new purpose-built facility he was able to dispense with desks and introduce other practices which benefitted his students. Subsequent appointments included senior lecturer in education at Whitelands College, Roehampton, headships at Haslewood School in Hoddesdon, Hartsbourne, at Bushey Heath, Elmhurst Middle school in the middle of a large council estate in Aylesbury which was visited by the late Princess Diana on two occasions, and finishing as Head of French at Haileybury Junior school, Windsor, in 1988.

I first met him in 1961, as a result of my Father spotting a notice in the *Buckingham Advertiser*, asking that anyone with an interest in coins come to a meeting at Buckingham Town Hall, with a view to forming a local numismatic society. I don't remember much about our first encounter but the numismatic society got off the ground and we subsequently met for many years at Whitchurch, which in my early teens was a daunting 25-mile round-trip bike ride at night! By 1965 George had started to specialise in two distinct fields – medieval jetons, an early interest of his, of which he had already formed a considerable collection by the mid 1950s (which will be dispersed in these rooms in December), and Buckinghamshire 17th century trade tokens. With the latter he always joked that he had a head start on me (I didn't start with local tokens until 1969), but for the next 30 years or so we competed for, studied and, most importantly, enjoyed our tokens and the fruits of our combined research. We published a new county listing in *BNJ* in 1973 and for the past few years had been working towards a comprehensive revision. In recent years he whittled some other areas of his collection down to raise funds for new purchases and had been singularly successful: our last conversation, 3 weeks before his death on 7 April, concerned Lot 286 in this catalogue, a Newport Pagnell token which he was looking forward to acquiring.

George Berry, a raconteur *par excellence* and renowned Francophile, was my first mentor in numismatics; a thoroughly good man, someone who never gave up on anyone and always had words of encouragement to offer to all, young or old. His wife, Barbara, pre-deceased him in 1998; he leaves a son, Ian, and daughter Judith. **P.J.P-M.**



# Peter Mann (1932-2013)

eter George Hubert Mann was born on 30 May 1932 in Kuala Lumpur of colonial parents. He left for England with his Mother and sister just before the Japanese invasion. His Father remained at his post and was imprisoned in Changi prison.

Peter joined the junior King's School, Canterbury, in 1938 and was evacuated with the school to the Carlyon Bay Hotel in Cornwall to avoid the Blitz. During his time in Cornwall he formed an interest in collecting Kent tokens and on various exeats he travelled to London to spend his precious pocket money on them.

He was present when Field-Marshal Bernard Montgomery, an old boy of the school, addressed the boys about the North Africa campaign.

Peter joined the senior King's School in Canterbury in 1945 as a King's Scholar. He learned to fly with the R.A.F. section of the CCF. After completing his education at King's he deferred his university entrance and joined the RAF for his National Service as a Pilot Officer.

After conversion to jets in Canada he flew, amongst other aircraft, Gloster Meteors and had the dubious honour of crashing one, which cost the taxpayer a quarter of a million pounds at the time. He was cleared of blame after an enquiry which detected a malfunction of the undercarriage. Very lucky to escape with his life, he got out just before the plane blew up.

After National Service Peter took up his deferred place at London University to train as a veterinary surgeon, a decision he had made many years before. Eventually he had his own practice.

He was very involved with veterinary politics and became President of the British Small Animal Veterinary Association, a member of the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons Council and was voted a Fellow by election. In later life he was the Veterinary Director of the P.D.S.A., the largest charitable veterinary practice in the World.

Even in retirement he maintained his interest and work with his chosen profession, as well as his interest in Kent tokens.





George Hudson (1800-71), b. Howsham, E. Yorkshire, was apprenticed to Bell & Nicholson, drapers, in York in 1815. In 1821 he married Elizabeth Nicholson, daughter of one of the partners, receiving a share in the business himself which, by 1827, was one of the largest employers in the city. Utilising a legacy of £30,000 from a great-uncle, he joined the Tory party and, in 1833, took a leading part in the establishment of the York Union Banking Co. That same year he became treasurer of what was to become the York & North Midland Railway Co, formed to construct a railway from York to link up with the Leeds-Selby line. Crucially, he convinced George Stephenson, whom he met for the first time in Whitby in 1835, to route Stephenson's line from Newcastle-upon-Tyne to London through York, rather than bypassing the city on the way to Leeds. Hudson served three terms as mayor of York and in the early 1840s his influence in the burgeoning railway mania led to the amalgamation of several companies and the formation of the Midland Railway in 1844, by which time Hudson, now dubbed the 'Railway King', controlled 1,016 miles of railway track and had £319,835 invested in railway shares. With his new-found wealth Hudson acquired several estates in Yorkshire and was elected MP for Sunderland in 1845, holding the seat until 1859. However, by 1848, Hudson's practice of paying dividends out of company capital started to undermine his empire and shares in railway companies crashed. Hudson was forced to resign the chairmanship of his companies and in order to flee his creditors went to live in France. Returning to England to fight the 1865 general election for the seat of Whitby, he was arrested and imprisoned in York Castle

### **Robinson S. Brown Jr (1917-2005)**



orn in Louisville, Kentucky, on 6 May 1917, Robinson Swearingen Brown Jr, or 'Robbie' to his many friends, was the grandson of George Garvin Brown (1846-1917), a pharmaceutical salesman who, with his half-brother John Thompson Street Brown Jr, established J.T.S. Brown & Bro., whiskey blenders and marketers, in 1870. What began as a small local concern bottling and selling Old Forester, their original brand of premier bourbon, evolved over time into the Brown-Forman Corporation, today one of the world's top ten wine and spirit organisations.

Robbie's uncle, the outgoing Owsley Brown (1879-1952), who started work at the company in 1904, assumed the management of it from G.G. Brown in 1917. In 1934 Owsley's younger brother, Robinson Swearingen Brown Sr (1886-1968), joined the company's senior management team who directed the firm through the precocious years of Prohibition and the Great Depression, enabling the succeeding generation of management to expand the product line beyond Kentucky in the 1950s and 1960s with the acquisition of Jack Daniel's Tennessee whiskey, Old Bushmills Irish whiskey, Southern Comfort and other brands.

Growing up in Louisville during the Depression, Robbie studied engineering at the University of Virginia. During World War II he was a pilot in the Army Air Corps. Honourably discharged with the rank of captain in 1945 he returned to the family firm, where he rose to become Brown-Forman's first executive director of sales and marketing. He was elected chairman in 1971 and retired from that office in June 1982.

Robbie was also very active in social, civic and political affairs, serving on a number of boards and committees. In late 1956, while working in Brown-Forman's public relations and personnel department, he was asked to head a committee planning events for the 1957 Kentucky Derby Festival and appointed the first chairman of the modern Derby. Believing in doing things right, Robbie requested a three months leave from work in early 1957 to ensure it ran successfully. Subsequently he was greatly honoured when, on the eve of his 88th birthday, he was invited to serve as 'Thundernator' for the 2005 Thunder Over Louisville fireworks show, the traditional pyrotechnic curtain-raiser to the Kentucky Derby. in 1975 he served as president of the Louisville Chamber of Commerce. He was a former chairman of the board of trustees of Bellarmine College (now University), from whom he received a law doctorate, and was a founding member of the Louisville Zoological Commission. He particularly supported the Louisville organisation Prodigal Ministries, which help men and women released from prison to re-establish themselves by starting a new life, devoid of crime.

Robbie's interest in coins began in the early 1960s. In 1964 he bought 16 different date U.S. large cents from a dealer in New Orleans, and that was the trigger to specialise in the series. Acquiring copies of Sheldon's *Penny Whimsy* and Newcomb's *United States Copper Cents 1816-1857*, and subsequently joining the fledgling Early American Coppers society, he set out to complete all the varieties and different die states of the entire span of years from 1793 to 1857. Only five others had previously managed it, including Sheldon himself, George Clapp, Ted Naftzger (whose collection was auctioned recently) and Denis Loring. But Robbie achieved the feat – twice! His first collection, catalogued into 1,456 lots by Jack Collins, with assistance from Del Bland, Walter Breen and others, was auctioned by Superior Galleries in West Hollywood on 30 September and 1 October 1986. Following that sale he immediately began assembling another collection using his duplicates which, minus the late dates, was completed in 1995; this went under the hammer in 683 lots with Superior in Beverly Hills on 27 January 1996. The later date business strikes, from 1840 to 1857, an extensive run, subsequently became the third Robinson S. Brown Jr collection to be auctioned by Superior on 2 June 2002, the 1,543-lot catalogue being the work of Bob Grellman and Stuart Rubenfeld.

Like some before him and many since, the basis for Robbie's introduction to 18th century British trade tokens as a collecting field lay with the contemporary American copper series. Fellow EAC member Myles Gerson (1925-86), of Flossmoor, Illinois, sold him a tranche of duplicates in April 1978 and now Robbie had two main spheres of interest. Gerson was a considerable source of supply in the early days as he upgraded his own collection, auctioned by Spink in 1986 and 1987 after Patrick Deane, Jim Noble and Jerry Bobbe had first pick in 1985. Jerry Bobbe, who purchased his first 'Conder' tokens in 1972 and was an early mentor of Gerson's in the series, moved to Portland, Oregon in 1978 and by the early 1980s had started to sell tokens to Robbie. Perusing this catalogue it will be obvious that many of the best tokens in the collection have come through Jerry's hands one way or another, because over nearly a quarter-century Jerry became Robbie's 'eyes and ears' in the market, especially latterly as Robbie's collection grew to a size on a par with that formed by Jim Noble. The Noble sale of 1998 provided many opportunities for Robbie, both at the auction and afterwards, with acqusitions from Jerry, from Allan Davisson and from Richard Gladdle. Apart from a few direct purchases at DNW auctions, Richard was Robbie's only direct UK contact; Robbie enjoyed a plentiful supply via the domestic market, from people like Phil Flanagan, who traded as Gothic Coins out of Akron, Ohio, and after 1985 under his own name from Coupeville, Washington; from the Hawaiian-based dealer Simon Cordova; from Denis Loring when he was based in New York; from Joel Spingarn, the Georgetown, Connecticut-based collector and co-founder of the Conder Token Collectors Club, whom Robbie had met at an EAC convention and introduced to the series; from CTCC founder Wayne Anderson (1941-99) in Maple Grove, Minnesota, and many others.

Whether it was collecting U.S. large cents or 18th century tokens, Robbie was always meticulous to note the provenance of every piece and his detailed records have been of immense help in compiling these series of catalogues. To my knowledge, he only wrote about his tokens on one occasion, as a contribution to the November 1996 edition of the *Conder Token Collectors Journal* (p.31). There he went on record as owning 3,120 pieces; that number was to rise to over 5,300 tokens, including several hundred duplicates, by the time of his death, at the age of 88, on 28 July 2005.

This auction, the last of five annual dispersals of the main collection which began in 2009, features 483 different tokens from Ireland, together with two pieces reattributed from the Scottish DH series. This is the largest such dispersal of Irish tokens to have taken place since 1998 and brings the total number of different tokens and medals in the collection to a total of 4,434, a phenomenal achievement. Robbie's U.S.-related tokens were sold in DNW's pre-Coinex auctions in 2009 and 2010; his duplicates will be the subject of a sale in Spring 2014.

Robbie was an inspiring role model, always demonstrating a tremendous commitment to honesty and integrity. With his quiet, unassuming demeanour, he was known for a wonderful sense of humour and a twinkle in his eye. His wife, Jean McCauley Brown, whom he met during the War and married in 1942, died in 2004; they leave five children, 14 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

# THE LATE ROBINSON S. BROWN JR COLLECTION (Part V)

In accordance with DNW house style, this collection has been catalogued by location rather than by denomination as in Dalton and Hamer; in this way pieces relative to each other and specific to a particular locality are easier to find. Tokens issued by named individuals are listed alphabetically, preceding those struck by manufacturers for specious gain. The opportunity has been taken to record the weight and die-axis of each piece, information which might not only help pinpoint pieces from the collection in future years should original tickets and envelopes be discarded, but is also increasingly relevant to those who study the series in depth.

# Appendix: Notes on the Tokens and their Issuers

#### 1154

William Begg, chandler, 91 Marlborough street.

#### 1155

William Frederick Bentley & Co, pawnbrokers and later auctioneers, Bishop street. In 1798 William Binns, an ironmonger, rebuilt what is now 25 and 26 St. Stephen's Green as a house with a toy and fancy goods shop, at the back of which, in Kildare Street, he erected a tower with 'gazebo' on top. The business ceased in 1816, when the stock and contents of the shop were auctioned. The whole premises, known as the Pantheon Phusitechnikon, was later demolished (ex. inf. National Gallery of Ireland).

#### 1156

John Brewer, wine and spirit dealer.

#### 1157

Flynn, grocer, 11 Hammond lane, not shown in the 1801 trade directories. Talbot Fyan (not Talbort), grocer, 17 Poolbeg street.

#### 1158

Maxwell Hutton, 101 James street. Lloyd & Ridley, button manufacturers, 36 Castle street and Harold's cross. Benjamin O'Brien, master of the House of Industry.

#### 1159-62

M. Murphy, grocer and tea dealer, described as of 8 Wood street; not in the 1801 directories, which however give a Patrick Murphy, grocer and whiskey factor, at 7 Wood quay.

#### 1163-6

T. O'Bryen, grocer and tea dealer, Church street.

#### 1167

John Ord, tanner, 115-16 Cork street. William Parker, ironmonger, The Old Birmingham Warehouse, 4 Kennedy's lane.

## 1170

The official dispensation of charity in the city at the time was from 168 St James's gate, 44 Lower Kevin street, 55 Upper Coombe and 23 Barrack street.

#### 1196-7

Charles William Bury, Viscount Charleville (1764-1835), landowner, one of the post-1800 representative peers for Ireland; he and his wife, Catherine Maria Tisdall (*née* Dawson, †1851) divided their time between their country estates, centred on Charleville Castle, Tullamore, and a London residence. A landowning acquaintance, the architect Frederick Trench (1746-1836), of Heywood House, Ballinakill, co Laois, who by the tense of his letter to Matthew Boulton in April 1802 quoted by Doty (*CTCJ* September 2000, p.14) must have issued his own tokens (though these seem now unknown), put Boulton in touch with the Viscount. At least one die was engraved by J.G. Hancock Sr in 1802 and an initial batch of tokens sent to Ireland in February 1803; a second order was despatched in July 1804.

## 1198-9

Robert Woodcock, banker, thought to have been a Quaker, registered his business on 14 September 1799 (Doty, 2011, p.153); his tokens from Boulton, thought to subsume an earlier, possibly Irish-made issue, were despatched in two tranches in February 1801 (Doty, *CTCJ* June 2000, pp.74-8).

#### 1201-11

In 1786 the Hibernian Mine Co moved the centre of their operations from Cronebane, on the eastern bank of the Avoca river, to Ballymurtagh, on the western bank adjacent to Tigroney, selling the lease of the Cronebane mine to Charles Roe's new subsidiary, the Associated Irish Mine Co. The sale proved somewhat premature as in 1788 a rich seam of high grade copper ore was discovered at Cronebane which was to provide extremely lucrative revenue to the AIMC for many years. Intense rivalry between the Irish-owned HMC, founded

by John Howard Kyan, who ran the business with Turner Camac (1751-1830) as the chairman and his brother James Camac, and the English-controlled Cronebane mines was to become a dominant theme in their two close-knit histories. No doubt the bad feelings between the two companies, and their ethnically different workforces, reached a peak during the civil unrest in Ireland which led up to the abortive Irish Rebellion of 1798; in the event Kyan himself died penniless. A contemporary report on the company said that, compared to the AIMC, it used antiquated methods of production. Turner Camac, who lived at Greenmount Lodge, Kilsaran, co Louth, was high sheriff of co Louth in 1789 and a founder and director of the Grand Canal Co in Dublin in 1791. Subsequent to his marriage to an American, Sarah Masters, he emigrated to Woodvale, Philadelphia, in 1804 and served as a volunteer sergeant in the 1812 War of Independence.

#### 1218-21

The Associated Irish Mine Co, a subsidiary of Roe & Co, acquired the mining rights at Cronebane and Tigroney on the east side of the Avoca river from the Hibernian Mine Co (q.v.) in May 1787. By July of that year the mine employed about 100 men, mainly from the company's Anglesey operation, who were paid 10*d* a day in summer and 8*d* a day in winter; ore was transported 16 miles to Wicklow for shipment onward to Macclesfield. The discovery of the rich vein of high grade copper at Cronebane in 1788 led to a vast increase in production and a need for tokens, which were struck by Matthew Boulton, as a sub-contractor for John Westwood, in the months prior to September 1789, at the same time as Roe & Co's Macclesfield pieces (Doty, *CTCJ* November 1996, pp.16-21; Smith, *CTCJ* Spring 2002, pp.19-25).

- 9 (a) The buyer shall at his or her own expense take away the lot(s) purchased not later than 5 working days after the day of the auction but (unless credit terms have been agreed in accordance with Condition 7) not before payment to Dix Noonan Webb of the 'total amount due'.
- (b) The buyer shall be responsible for any removal, storage and insurance charges on any lot not taken away within 5 working days after the day of the auction.

31 These Conditions shall be governed by and construed in accordance with English law. All transactions to which these Conditions apply and all matters connected therewith shall also be governed by English law. Dix Noonan Webb hereby submits to the exclusive jurisdiction of the English courts and all other parties concerned hereby submit to the non-exclusive jurisdiction of the English courts.

#### 32 In these Conditions:

- (a) 'catalogue' includes any advertisement, brochure, estimate, price list or other publication;
- (b) 'hammer price' means the price at which a lot is knocked down by the auctioneer to the buyer;
