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

Cole Nevan Danehower (1954-2015)

Cole Danehower was born in Louisville, Kentucky, on 28 September 1954, where his father was working on the installation of one of the first mainframe computers. Shortly thereafter, his parents, George and Jacqueline, moved the family to Naperville, Illinois, where he spent much of his childhood in the countryside riding horses in what was then a rural area. His fondest childhood memories were of fishing at the family's cabin in Ely, Minnesota. He spent a year living in Mexico City where his father, a partner at Arthur Anderson, was on assignment. Subsequently the family moved to the San Francisco Bay area where Cole graduated from Menlo Atherton High School. He went on to study at Claremont McKenna College, Claremont, California, earning a B.A. degree in History and International Relations, Cum Laude.

Cole put his interest in history to work at the numismatic firm of Bowers and Ruddy in Los Angeles, while doing graduate coursework in history at San Jose State University. The pursuit of history, especially the studies of World War I and Winston Churchill, was Cole's passion. He was expert at spotting and identifying vintage aircraft. Living near Moffett Field in Mountain View, California, and later near the Evergreen Aviation Museum in McMinnville, Oregon, gave him ample opportunity to do so.

He became fascinated by the historical value of 17th century tokens in researching what was to him the most interesting period of London's past. The tokens were uniquely able to bring to life the look and feel of Greater London of the mid-1600s. Through study of the tokens, as well as maps and other artifacts, Cole brought together the historical details to illustrate the life and economy of the period. He was able to travel to London often and began his collection in the late 1980s.

Living in California's Silicon Valley, he built a career in marketing communications for technology firms, including Tandem Computers, Hewlett Packard, and multiple startups. During these years Danehower developed an interest in wine, with regular explorations to the Napa Valley and California's wine regions. In 1998, looking to expand his writing opportunities, he moved north to Oregon and pursued his newest interest in writing about wine in the fledgling wine area of the Pacific Northwest. It was here that he met his wife, Andrea Danehower, and was married in 2000.

Cole was enamoured with the wines he experienced in Oregon and even more so with the winemakers and the places of the Pacific Northwest. He began a publication, The Oregon Wine Report, chronicling the developing industry. In 2004 he was honoured for this work, winning the James Beard Journalism Award for the most outstanding food and wine newsletter in North America. Cole wrote for numerous publications and in 2004 released his own book, Essential Wines and Wineries of the Pacific Northwest, that presented his take on the unique wine character of Washington, Oregon, British Columbia and Idaho. For the last three years of his life Cole served as the correspondent for Washington, Oregon and Idaho to Hugh Johnson's Pocket Wine Book, the annual wine guide by the famed British author.

A frequent judge for national wine competitions and a popular speaker on the region's wines, Cole was the honoured recipient of the Oregon Wine Board's Industry Partner and Lifetime Achievement Awards. A man of many passions, from the historical past to promising futures, his interest and enthusiasm was apparent in the respect and love the wine community and his friends bestowed upon him when he died too early from cancer on 21 August 2015, aged 60.

David Blaess McDonald (1950-2019)

David McDonald, son of the late Arthur and Maxine Blaess McDonald, was born in Detroit on 3 March 1950. He began collecting coins at an early age, encouraged by his mother while the family was living in Newfoundland, where his father was stationed at the U.S. Naval Base Argentia. Canadian and Newfoundland coins were soon joined by U.S. coins as the collection grew. David earned a B.A. in political science from Gettysburg College in Pennsylvania, followed by an M.B.A. from Frostburg State University in Maryland. He became a pharmaceutical representative for Boehringer Ingelheim, retiring after thirty years of stellar service which included winning the company's sales award an unprecedented five times.

In addition to collecting coins, David was interested in ski-ing, kayaking, and real estate. He also found an interest in historical maps, atlases and engravings, which became part of his business when he founded Westminster Rare Coins in 2005 after his retirement. His efforts always found the support of his family, his wife Patricia, whom he met at Gettysburg College, and their children Brooke, Melissa and Kelsey. Health concerns led to the closing of WRC in 2014.

David also collected Scottish coins and British tokens and medals. In 2004 Dix Noonan Webb had the pleasure of selling his collection of Scottish coins and tokens; he was also a friend and colleague of David Litrenta, whose token collection was offered in four DNW sales in 2005 and 2006. David died after a lengthy illness, on 9 February 2019.

Andy Singer

I first met David McDonald at a coin fair in New Carrollton, near Washington, one summer in the mid-1980s. He came bounding up to my stand and asked if I could sell for him a copper Isle of Man halfpenny that he had bought as part of a larger lot. It was long before the days of 'slabbing' but as the piece was in mint condition with good red lustre I knew that I could sell it well.

An hour or so later he came back and was surprised to discover what I had achieved in getting for it. I think it was at this point two things happened – his interest in British tokens, coupled with an appreciation of condition, was born and secondly a lifetime friendship between the two of us was established.

A few days later I was invited to his house in Westminster, MD, to meet Patti his wife and their three daughters – young Brooke, toddler Melissa and babe-in-arms Kelsey. I was soon introduced to the McDonald tradition of a crab dinner! Locally caught crabs were steamed in highly piquant spices and once cooked everyone dug in in a sort of frenzied free-for-all. They were without doubt the most messy meals I have ever partaken in – but also one of the most delicious!

From then on I would see David six or seven times a year, using his house as a base during the Baltimore and New York fairs and ANAs, travelling over from the UK laden with tokens. David would buy from me and I from him, and soon he possessed an extensive stock and a good collection of 18th century tokens, in addition to Scottish coins which he was also putting aside.

Throughout the late '80s and early '90s we shared tables at the various ANA coin shows. I would arrive at his house and we would set off in his well-appointed campervan to faraway ANA venues such as Milwaukee, St Louis, Pittsburgh and Chicago. On the way we would take in rivers such as the Upper Potomac, Youghiogheny or the Ohiopyle where he taught me to white-water raft and to kayak. He had done these sports for many years and even in spite of a back injury was very proficient! David also come to Britain in search of tokens, attending many important auctions here and becoming one of the principal dealers in Conder tokens in the US. In turn I took him to the river Cam in Cambridge and taught him the slightly more sedate activity of 'punting'!

Dealing in coins was not David's main occupation – he held down a busy position in the pharmaceutical world. He also expended much energy buying and renovating residential properties around Maryland, as well as a ski chalet just over the state border in West Virginia in which he invested a lot of time and, I am sure, cash. I remember extending my winter trip to the Baltimore coin fair several times to nip down to this beautiful lodge in the Canaan valley for a couple of days' ski-ing!

These tokens were his speciality throughout his numismatic adventure and at all the Baltimore coin fairs he could be relied to have a large selection. As a dealer he was easy to get on with and was incredibly generous and friendly. Nothing was ever too much trouble. He will be very much missed at the coin fairs in Maryland and by all the numismatic community of the Eastern States. For me it is not just the loss a colleague in the coin trade but also of a very good friend who features so very strongly in the path of my own life.

Michael Paterson (1945-2019)

Michael was born in Leith, Scotland, on 12 January 1945, and from a young age was interested in collecting things. Firstly stamps, but at the age of 13 it was coins that was to become a lifetime interest. His collection of coins and tokens reflected Edinburgh and Leith, where he was born, but also Fife, to where his family moved when he was 15 years old. His mother was originally from Worcester, which accounts for his additional interest in tokens from that county as well. Michael was not interested in the internet until he discovered its use for adding to his collection, and before long packages were arriving in Inverness from all over the world; Michael and all his postmen were on first-name terms. He would spend many nights in his study searching for items to add to his collection, which is one of the most comprehensive of its kind ever put together and rivals that of the Scottish series put together by Norman Brodie and David McDonald, both of which were sold by DNW in the early years of the present century. Michael was a familiar face at token auctions and the annual Token Congress for many years – he sadly died on 17 January 2019.

Francis Stewart Cokayne (1871-1945)

Francis Cokayne was born on 7 August 1871 at Ashbourne House, Putney, the south London home of his parents, George Edward Adams, FSA (1825-1911), a barrister at Lincoln's Inn, and his wife, Mary Dorothea, née Gibbs (1833-1906). He was the seventh of eight children; his Father assumed the name Cokayne in August 1873 when he was appointed Clarenceux King of Arms. The Cokayne family moved to Exeter House, Roehampton in 1885. Cokayne was educated at Charterhouse, 1884-90, where he excelled at racquets; going up to Oriel College, Oxford in 1890, he continued to play racquets and tennis for his college and passed out with a BA in 1893. Appointed a partner in the City firm of David Bevan & Co, stockbrokers, in 1899, he became a member of the London Stock Exchange. In December 1909, at the age of 38, he married Dorothy Emily Probyn (1889-1963), second daughter of Sir Leslie Probyn, KCMG (1862-1938), a former lawyer and then Governor of Sierra Leone. The family settled at 54 Montagu Square, London; their only son, Thomas Probyn Cokayne (1920-43), a lieutenant in the 70th Field Regt, RA and an escaped prisoner of war, died in Lazio, Italy, in October 1943, but their three daughters, Elizabeth, Anne and Susan, all lived into old age. In 1929 the Cokayne family moved to 1 Bryanston Square, London, and with the onset of war moved to Hatfield, Hertfordshire, where Cokayne died on 31 March 1945.

According to the late James O'Donald Mays, writing in 1991, Cokayne's interest in numismatics developed while he was at Oxford. Certainly by the mid-1890s he had started to collect tokens, and by the turn of the century was a regular customer of the dealers Lincoln, Spink and Baldwin. He was a shrewd but avid buyer, either through the dealers or in his own name, at the principal auctions between 1900 and 1940, and tickets in his distinctive hand are widely known among present-day connoisseurs of the various series of tokens, tickets and passes that he collected. Because he was active for so long, and had the financial wherewithal to back up his knowledge, Cokayne acquired tokens from many of the best-known cabinets of the day - Lloyd, Davis, Norman, Dudman, Bliss, Dalton, Clements, Harris, McKenzie, Hamer, Fletcher, to name but a few. Regular visits to the coin shops of Edgar Lincoln in Holles Street, Holborn, and to Albert Baldwin in Duncannon Street, and later the Adelphi, where he became a particular friend of Albert's second son, Fred Baldwin (1889-1970), would invariably result in new acquisitions, although acquisitions from Spink tended to be pieces that Cokayne had spotted in the company's Numismatic Circular, whether upon the Circular's publication, or occasionally when the compiler of the company's token lists had sent Cokayne an advanced 'pre-publication' copy.

Apart from numismatics, Cokayne regularly undertook trips to Scotland for shooting and fishing, and to the continent of Europe for sightseeing. A keen naturalist, he also collected butterflies and wild flowers and maintained a notable wine cellar.

Cokayne suffered two burglaries during his lifetime, a result of him keeping his collection at home. Each time the collection was rebuilt, and what remained at the end of his life was the best and most comprehensive collection of British 18th and 19th century tokens ever formed by a single person. Pieces of museum quality abound among this, the last major group of his 19th century copper tokens to be sold; his contemporary silver tokens, catalogued by Fred Baldwin, were sold by Glendining's in 1946. Most of the following tokens were hand-picked for their unusually fine condition – the 19th century series was struck for a genuine need, rather than as collector's pieces, so the vast majority only exist in Fine or, at best, VF. One of the prizes here, Lot 916, is by far the most important early 19th century Welsh token in existence, with only four owners from new, but there are many others to delight the connoisseur in the following pages.

Although referred to in the latest literature as patterns never released for circulation, it seems likely, from the wear on the surviving specimens (of which several have appeared on the market over the years, this being the fourth example auctioned by DNW since 2007), that these coins did enter circulation for a limited time. Weighing five and a half ounces each, they owe their probable existence to the temporary low price of copper relative to silver at the time (*cf.* Noble I, lot 1921, note). The last time this token was on the open market, at the second Norman sale in 1905, it brought £17 10s (the equivalent of £2,100 today), easily the top price in that auction



David Brandon Griffiths (1940-2011)

David Griffiths was born in Conway, North Wales, on 8 November 1940, moving to London when he was five. Like many expatriates, he became very keen to retain his links with his mother country, and in addition to representing it at athletics in sprint events, he realised how interesting it was to link local history with collecting.

Initially he collected Welsh 17th century tokens, triggered by the 1973 publication of George Boon's book on the subject. But, finding out how much individual 17th century tokens cost and, encouraged by Monica Bussell (1906-74) at Seaby's, David decided to start collecting Welsh 18th century tokens, principally Anglesey. He put together what is believed to be the largest collection of these pieces ever assembled, which was sold by DNW in 2014 as part of the current dispersal of David's collection, begun in 2011.

The present element of the collection being offered spans the range of tokens issued by or for numismatists, a particular interest of David's during his 38 years of collecting this material. The following 124 lots embrace the largest such collection of this material ever offered in one auction in modern times, even exceeding the notable Noble collection sold in 1999, from which a number of pieces here derive. The late Siegfried Schwer (1936-2006) shared David's special interest in them and was the source of a number of acquisitions from the early 1980s. Provenance was important to David and there are pieces here from many of the significant dispersals of tokens held over the last century.

A regular at the annual British Token Congress for many years, David single-handedly ran the 1998 event at Hemel Hempstead and was a co-organiser of the Congress when it visited Warwick in 2008. David was principal of a firm of chartered accountants and, apart from coins, had many other interests, principally politics, and was a long-term Liberal Democrat, contesting two parliamentary and two European seats. He was a former treasurer of the Liberal Democrats and Liberal International, and for many years treasurer of the National Benevolent Fund for the Aged. Away from business, he followed the fortunes of his beloved Queens Park Rangers football club in west London and was a regular at Loftus Road.

Sadly, David succumbed to a lengthy illness on 3 September 2011, leaving a son, Gareth, daughter Justine and three grandchildren. A regular attender at almost all the significant British token auctions for almost 30 years, he was a familiar figure who plotted new acquisitions, whether in the saleroom or from a dealer's list, with an assiduous purpose, set himself limits and was not often bested for something he really wanted.

Sir Augustus Wollaston Franks (1826-97), antiquary, collector and museum curator; born in Geneva, educated at Eton and Trinity College, Cambridge, moved to London in 1849 and in 1851 was appointed an assistant in the newly-established Department of Antiquities at the British Museum, under the supervision of Edward Hawkins. In 1866 Franks was appointed Keeper of British and Medieval Antiquities and Ethnography, a position he held until his retirement in 1896. Of independent means, Franks was one of the major benefactors to the Museum in the 19th century and the subject of a recent reference edited by Marjorie Caygill and John Cherry, A.W. Franks, Nineteenth-Century Collecting and the British Museum (London, 1997). In that reference, Luke Syson speculates that Franks had these pieces struck as gifts for friends, in the manner of similar silver counters struck by Sir Robert Cecil and other officers of state at the beginning of the 17th century

Ralph Heaton & Son, founded by Ralph Heaton II (1794-1862) and his eldest son, Ralph Heaton III (1827-91), acquired the presses and equipment of the Soho Mint on 29 April 1850. Samuel Hiron, a printer from Dudley with stationery works at 5 Newhall street, established an embossing press and ticket and checkmaking factory at 52 St Paul's square, Birmingham; he was succeeded in the business by his manager in Birmingham, Edwin Cottrill. Sale Ltd, Constitution hill and later at Summer lane, was founded by Henry Bailey Sale (†1901), a letter-cutter and engraver, in 1862; the present limited company was formed in the wake of the founder's death at his home in Solihull. Sir Edward Thomason (1769-1849), medallist and token manufacturer, 28 Church street, was articled to Matthew Boulton in 1785. Following the death of his father, also Edward, in 1793, Thomason took over the family firm of buttonmakers, expanding the business into the manufacture of tokens, medals and, when he could obtain them, coinage contracts. The company was sold in 1835 to a firm headed by the medallist G.R. Collis and Thomason continued to work there until his retirement in 1844, when he removed to Ludlow, and later Warwick, where he died in 1849

Sir George Chetwynd, 2nd Bt (1783-1850), Grendon Hall, Atherstone, was collecting tokens by the end of the reign of George III. His collection, said to be the best in existence in the second quarter of the 19th century, was catalogued by Thomas Sharp in 1834 and sold by his eldest son through Christie's in 1872. By profession Chetwynd was a lawyer, called to the Bar in 1813; he served as MP for Stafford 1820-6 and subsequently High Sheriff for Warwickshire, 1828-9. He lived firstly at the family seat, Brocton Hall, near Stafford, relocating to Grendon Hall after the death of his father in 1824. Grendon Hall was demolished in 1933



Frederick James Jeffery (1907-78), who styled himself as 'England's leading provincial coin dealer', started dealing in coins in 1932. Popularly known as 'Uncle Fred' (though not to be confused with Fred Baldwin who also shared the same sobriquet), Jeffery was the first English dealer to regularly attend the American Numismatic Association's annual convention. His open-style marketing methods and his vast stock ensured that he was well known and he was a fervent supporter of local numismatic societies, often travelling vast distances to a meeting with an estate car laden down with coins and sets to sell to members. His metallic tokens commemorate his 40th year in a business that is carried on today by his son, Richard Jonathan Jeffery; the tokens themselves were struck by Toye Kenning & Spencer in 1973, a decision prompted by the same manufacturer having struck the Wessex Numismatic Society's Silver Jubilee medal earlier that year, Jeffery being then a prominent member of that Society

Samuel Henry Hamer (1859-1930), engineer and lathe chuck manufacturer, Range lane, Halifax, from 1888, lived at Bank House, Halifax; noted iron founder, antiquary and token collector; co-author with Richard Dalton of the standard work on British 18th century tokens. Gerald Lorenzo Chorley (1848-1933), 17 Cromer terrace and later 23 Lyddon terrace, Leeds, formerly manager of a cotton mill in Manchester, was the son of Dr Henry Chorley (1810-78), a respected surgeon and JP at 8 Park square, Leeds. 19 If, notwithstanding that, the buyer fails to pay to DNW the 'total amount due' within three weeks after the auction and DNW remits the 'sale proceeds' to the seller, the ownership of the lot shall pass to DNW.

20 Charges for withdrawn lots

Every person interested should exercise and rely on his or her own judgement as to such matters and neither DNW nor its servants or agents are responsible for the correctness of such opinions.
- 26 Whilst the interests of prospective buyers are best served by attendance at the auction, DNW will, if so instructed, execute bids on their behalf. Neither DNW nor its servants or agents are responsible for any neglect or default in doing so or for failing to do so.
- 27 DNW shall have the right, at its discretion, to refuse admission to its premises or attendance at its auctions by any person.
- 28 DNW has absolute discretion without giving any reason to refuse any bid, to divide any lot, to combine any two or more lots, to withdraw any lot from the auction and in case of dispute to put up any lot for auction again.
- 29 (a) Any indemnity under these Conditions shall extend to all actions, proceedings costs, expenses, claims and demands whatever incurred or suffered by the person entitled to the benefit of the indemnity.
- (b) DNW declares itself to be a trustee for its relevant servants and agents of the benefit of every indemnity under these Conditions to the extent that such indemnity is expressed to be for the benefit of its servants and agents.
- 30 Any notice by DNW to a seller, consignor, prospective bidder or buyer may be given by first class mail or airmail and if so given shall be deemed to have been duly received by the addressee 48 hours after posting.
- 31 These Conditions shall be governed by and construed in accordance with English law. All transactions to which these Conditions apply and all matters connected therewith shall also be governed by English law. DNW hereby submits to the exclusive jurisdiction of the English courts and all other parties concerned hereby submit to the non-exclusive jurisdiction of the English courts.

32 In these Conditions:

- (a) 'catalogue' includes any advertisement, brochure, estimate, price list or other publication;
- (b) 'hammer price' means the price at which a lot is knocked down by the auctioneer to the buyer;
- (c) 'total amount due' means the 'hammer price' in respect of the lot sold together with any premium, Value Added Tax chargeable and additional charges and expenses due from a defaulting buyer in pounds sterling;


