

The 'Millennium' Hoard of Æthelred II Pennies and cut Halfpence from Suffolk

The following hoard of 99 coins (81 pence and 18 cut halfpence) was found by Don Crawley (pictured) in East Anglia in 2017 and disclaimed under the terms of the 1996 Treasure Act in the summer of 2019. The coins comprise a most unusual group amassed and buried within a few years of the first millennium.

The conventional dating of the coinage of Æthelred II predicates a six-year recoinage cycle covering the king's reign (979-1016). The Crux issue is thus dated to the years c. 991-7, while the ensuing Long Cross issue spans the period c. 997-1003. This hoard is numismatically extraordinary, particularly with regard to the 59 fully identifiable Crux coins. Almost all of these can be designated as 'Small Crux' type (Hildebrand type Ca), struck on small module and lightweight flans, a later sub-issue of the main type and dated after c. 995. In line with J.J. North's English Hammered Coinage, p.161, we have chosen the perhaps slightly arbitrary weight of 1.35g (20.8 grains) to separate the two varieties of the issue.

Out of a total of 59 coins, only six are regular Crux issue with a weight over 1.35g, while 53 weigh less; some much less, tipping the scales at no more than 0.80g. For such a preponderance of rare and unusual varieties to occur in a single hoard is indeed unexpected. Geographically, these pieces originate almost entirely from eastern mints: Cambridge, Colchester, Huntingdon, Lincoln, Louth, Melton Mowbray, Norwich, Stamford, Thetford and York [and see footnote to lot 35 for the coin of Malmesbury].

The hoard would appear to consist of two distinct parts; the Crux coins as described and originating mostly from Lincolnshire, East Anglia and Essex, while the subsequent Long Cross coins show a more southern distribution, with 10 out of 19 struck at London. Most of these latter pieces, as well as the 18 cut halfpence, show little sign of circulation, suggesting a terminus ante quem of no later than 1003.

Since being disclaimed, most of the coins have been carefully cleaned and this process has revealed apparent differences in the fineness of metal. Unfortunately, in the few weeks available to catalogue the hoard, it has not been possible to commission specific gravity or x-ray fluoroscopy tests, but observation suggests that the sole coin of Colchester, together with some of the specimens from Stamford and Thetford in particular, are rather less than sterling fine. One small light coin of York (lot 60) could well pass as a Scandinavian copy but for the secure English provenance and the tight dateline provided by the hoard. One wonders if, around 996, Æthelred decided to 'short-change' the Vikings by buying them off with poor quality, lightweight coinage. The subsequent heavy, fine silver Long Cross issue (see lots 62-80), suggest the recipients were not fooled for long and presumably made their feelings on the matter abundantly clear. Alternatively, with the bulk of available specie being exported, perhaps the home populace were left with a substandard circulating medium.

Deposition

The coins were found under the remains of a Saxon church believed to have been demolished soon after the Norman conquest. Might the two unusual and precisely folded pennies represent a religious offering – part of a payment donated to the Church by a repentant sinner, frightened by the approaching Day of Judgement in the year 1000?

Highlights of the Hoard

Cambridge

Although only three coins of Cambridge are present, they are all remarkable in their own way. The coin of Eadmund has a forked or trident sceptre and a Small Crux portrait of the king with monk-like hairstyle, while the specimen struck by Eadwine has extravagant swept back hair and an abstract profile made up of pellets and dashes. Most remarkable of all is the coin of Leofwine, a moneyer apparently unpublished for the mint and featuring a Late Transitional Crux portrait with hair ties and sceptre. Bearing in mind the Lincolnshire bias of the current hoard it is interesting to note that a moneyer Leofwine struck coins at Stamford in the Long Cross type and at Lincoln and Stamford in the Last Small Cross type.

Lincoln

The Crux coins of Lincoln are the most numerous (18 examples, of which eight are by the moneyer Theodgeld) and full of scarce and unusual varieties, many showing extra pellets in one, two or all four quarters of the reverse – variants only found on the Small Crux type (see H.A. Parsons 'Symbols and Double Names on Late Saxon Coins, BNJ 1917, pp.1-74). In the standard work on the mint, Mossop lists few of these unusual coins, making exact die identification with published specimens impossible in many cases. The only remarkable Long Cross coin in the hoard is by the moneyer Drengr, with a letter D in the third quarter of the reverse and struck from the same dies as Mossop pl. vii, 31. It is extremely rare.

Louth

The hoard includes a pair of unpublished coins of the moneyer Drengr for the mint of Louth, struck from different obverse and reverse dies. Drengr is not known at Lincoln during the Crux period but was a prolific moneyer there in the next three types; he may well have started his career at Louth. A mint at Louth (25 miles ENE of Lincoln as the crow flies) has previously been postulated (see Studies in Late Anglo-Saxon Coinage, pp.89 and 351). Four coins have been cautiously attributed to the mint: two of Edward the Martyr, one with the mint name LVVEIC, by the moneyer Ætheln (a moneyer only otherwise known at Horncastle, a mere 13 miles away), a second of Lincoln style with the incomplete mint reading LV (SCBI Edinburgh 655); and two of Æthelred II, a fragmentary First Hand coin reading LVDEV and a Long Cross issue attributed to London by Hildebrand reading OSGVT M'O LVD, although Osgeat is known only at Lincoln and Huntingdon.

Malmesbury

Since most known specimens read EALDRED, this may be an unpublished variety of the moneyer's name, although Eadred and Ealdred are normally considered to be different names. The mint reading is normally MALD, yet the current coin has an uncertain letter or symbol (rather like a pellet and crescent) after MAL. Given the predominance of eastern mints in the hoard, making Malmesbury a geographical outlier, in this case MAL might possibly represent Maldon in Essex, although on the coinage this is normally spelt MÆL with an Æ diphthong.

Melton Mowbray

A pair of unpublished coins of the moneyer Ketill for the mint of Melton Mowbray, struck from different obverse and reverse dies. Mark Blackburn, in an article in BNJ 2000, pp143-6, discusses the attribution of coins with the mint signature MEDELTVN to Melton Mowbray, altering Dolley's previous attribution of a fragment reading MED to Peterborough (Medeshamstede). Apart from Dolley's fragment, a First-Hand type of the moneyer Hild, a second example of this coin is now in the Fitzwilliam Museum, having been found in Hampshire in 1999. An unspecified type of Æthelred II with the uncertain moneyer's name Piztan derived from a 19th century hoard from Quendale (Shetland) and is now unfortunately lost. The fourth known specimen is a Cnut Quatrefoil type of the moneyer Leofdæg in the Berlin Museum Collection (SCBI Berlin 650)

Stamford

Amongst the nine Crux coins of Stamford, the moneyers Æscwig, Svartlingr and Wulfmær are not listed by Hildebrand for the type and are all very rare. The coin of Godleof has the letters in the angles of the cross disposed VXCR.

Thetford

The moneyer Deorwulf is not mentioned by Hildebrand, Carson or in Studies in Late Anglo-Saxon Coinage. EMC lists only two coins of Deorwulf struck under Æthelred II, a Long Cross type from London and a Last Small Cross type from York.

York

Another unpublished moneyer for the mint – Colsveinn – not known at York but a single specimen is known by a moneyer with the same name struck at Lincoln during the Last Small Cross type (SCBI Berlin 516). The moneyers Dagfinnr and Oskettil are not listed by Hildebrand for the type, both are very rare.

Leofwine is not known as a Cambridge moneyer (Jacob, *SCMB* 1984, p.38), but is attested at Lincoln and Stamford during Last Small Cross and at Stamford in Long Cross. This intriguing coin has long ties behind the head in the style of the Intermediate Small Cross (ISC) coins, and one is tempted to suggest it is an ISC die to which a sceptre has been added. (EMC has a heading ISC Sceptre, but no coins listed in the category)

The text of the document confirms Thomas Graham as 'Master and worker of all our monies both gold and silver within our Mint in our Tower of London and elsewhere within that part of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland called England with the net yearly salary or sum of one thousand five hundred pounds payable in our manner', in succession to the astronomer, chemist and polymath Sir John Frederick William Herschel, Bt (1792-1871), who himself had been appointed to the post on 16 December 1850 at the same salary (Challis, *History*, p.501). Graham's salary was paid in two annual instalments, on 5 January and 5 July, an arrangement that persisted until his death, in office at the age of 63, on 16 September 1869. The office was abolished and Robert Lowe (1811-92), then Chancellor of the Exchequer and MP for the new London University constituency, became the *ex-officio* Master, with the very able Charles Fremantle (1834-1914), continuing his 1868 appointment as Deputy Master.

Thomas Graham, born in Glasgow in December 1805, was the son of a textile manufacturer who wanted his son to enter the Church of Scotland. Instead, enrolling at Glasgow University in 1819, he studied chemistry under Prof. Thomas Thomson, passing out with an MA in 1824. Going on to study medicine at the University of Edinburgh, he returned to his native city as the first professor of chemistry at Anderson's Medical School in 1830. In 1831 his paper on the diffusion and effusion of gases to the Royal Society in Edinburgh won him international acclaim in what became known as 'Graham's Law' and he received the Society's Keith Medal, one of several significant medals awarded him throughout his career. In 1837 he was appointed professor of chemistry at University College, London and he founded the Chemical Society of London in 1841. With the resignation of Herschel from the Mastership of the Mint in 1855, he having masterminded reforms originally instigated by William Gladstone, Lord Palmerston appointed Graham to the post who, as Christopher Challis noted, 'already had knowledge of the Mint from his work as one of the non-resident assayers' (*History*, p.506). Graham's period in office, a little over 14 years, is today best remembered for his overseeing the introduction of the new bronze coinage in 1860, itself a reform originally contemplated by Gladstone as far back as 1844. Graham's copper survey, published in the summer of 1857 and seen by present-day scholars as having some serious shortcomings, nevertheless set in train the programme for change, if not decimalisation

The Rt Hon Sir Charles Wood, 1st Viscount Halifax, GCB, PC (1800-85), career politician, Liberal MP for Halifax and later Ripon, Chancellor of the Exchequer 1846-52, was Secretary of State for India from June 1859 to February 1866.

An Act of Parliament of 2 August 1858 transferred the powers and property of the East India Company to the Crown of England and Victoria assumed the government of India on 1 November 1858, although coins struck at the mints in Birmingham, Bombay, Calcutta and Madras continued the bear the names and title of the Company until November 1862. On 1 January 1859 Cosmo Melvill at the India Office requested the Treasury to authorise Thomas Graham to prepare 'a pair of matrices and puncheons' for each of the denominations currently in circulation (Pridmore 1980, p.51; Attwood, 2014, pp.326-7). But it was not until Wood was in post that the Treasury acted, with Graham being authorised to proceed on 30 June 1859. Practical matters moved slowly during late 1859 and early 1860, while L.C. Wyon busied himself with 'Indian designs'. A few patterns dated 1860 exist, but it was not until the summer of 1861 that all the necessary matrices and puncheons were ready for shipment to India

I rather miss something which shall wrongly distinguish the new coins for the Common eye – are you satisfied on this head? 4. How soon do you think you may be able to strike and issue? 5. I conclude that I have no further occasion to hand the coins to H.M.? Yours very faithfully, W. Gladstone."

William Ewart Gladstone (1809-98), one of the most influential figures in British history, was a Liberal politician whose career in Parliament lasted from 1832 to 1895. He served as Prime Minister over four terms between 1868 and 1894, and was thrice Chancellor of the Exchequer, including the period 1859-66.

In August 1859 Gladstone secured a sum of £10,000 from Parliament to assist in replacing the current copper coin with issues in bronze. Leonard Wyon spent much of the autumn of 1859 and the early weeks of 1860 refining his work on the new coins and by late February 1860 the first examples were in existence. A fresh pattern, still considered imperfect by the artist and with the precise obverse legend yet to be finalised, was forwarded by Thomas Graham to Gladstone on 8 March 1860 (Dyer and Gaspar, *BNJ* 1984, p.266), but this left no room for the contracted F D (Fidei Defensor); the text of this letter confirms Gladstone's wish that F D be retained on the coins

In early June 1860 the first proofs of the new bronze penny were struck, and by the end of the month Thomas Graham had submitted specimens to Gladstone for approval by Queen Victoria. The monarch requested alterations to the portrait, which were made and further specimens submitted. Final approval from the Queen followed and a copy of this historic letter from Gladstone, made by Wyon, was partly quoted by Dyer and Gaspar (*BNJ* 1984, p.268). By the end of September 1860 production of the new coins, in all denominations, was under way at the Mint

The text of the former reads: "My dear Sir, The Chancellor of the Exchequer was so urgent for the transcription of my Report on the Japanese currency question to Lord Russell, that I was unable to obtain the advantage of your previous perusal of it. I widen it, however, and shall be much obliged to you, if you will correct any mistakes with which I may have fallen, as I may still have the print altered. It is seldom that the dry question of currency is connected with so much of fearful interest as this Treaty with Japan involves. Yrs. very truly, G. Arbuthnot". The text of the latter reads: "My dear Sir, Many thanks for your information about the Japan coins, which will be very helpful to me. Yrs. very truly, G. Arbuthnot".

George Arbuthnot (1802-65), a career civil servant with the Treasury for 45 years, from July 1820 to July 1865, was private secretary to Sir Robert Peel and later to Sir Charles Wood, Viscount Halifax.

The Japanese currency question had its roots in the trade arrangements made by Commodore Matthew Perry with the Japanese in 1853. The monetary exchange rate set at the time favoured the Japanese who, for trade, preferred their own currency to the Mexican dollars prevalent in other areas of the Orient. In attempting to secure a 'weight-for-weight' equivalency, and associated recoinage fees, American officials even suggested bringing in their own moneyers who would work for less pay than the Japanese, but they were swiftly informed that Japanese law prohibited foreigners from engaging in coinage. By 1858 it had been agreed that all foreign coins should be current in Japan and pass for the corresponding weight of Japanese coin and in 1859-60 there was a huge outflow from Japan of local coins, especially gold; it was said that only Mexican dollars and ichibugin were being used in most trades. In 1862 the Japanese attempted to negotiate the currency question direct with the British government, and sent envoys to London to that end, but Treasury officials insisted that the matter should be dealt with in Edo. Arbuthnot himself had carefully analysed the currency situation in Japan and concluded that the Japanese were not at fault; if they established a mint to strike coin in exchange for bullion, at a fixed and moderate charge, they would be following other contemporary world practices. Yet it was not until 1870, and the advent of the Meiji era, that the Japanese government finally established a mint in Osaka

Because of the difficulties of integrating the British Imperial sterling system with the local standard, based on the Mexican dollar and used as the basis for trade with China, Hong Kong decided to adopt the latter as legal tender throughout the colony in 1861. The Royal Mint was authorised to prepare designs for the three smallest denominations, a silver 10 cents, bronze 1 cent and bronze 1 mil. A number of patterns were prepared in 1862, coupling Wyon's head of the Queen in uncrowned (British) and crowned (Indian) forms with reverses in a mix of British and Chinese characters. The approved designs to which Gladstone's letter refers were authorised by an Order in Council on 9 January 1863 and struck at the Mint; it was not until April 1863 that permission was granted for the erection of a branch mint in the colony, which itself proved to be a financial failure



The Kingdom of Italy was established by Napoleon on 17 March 1805, with the Emperor being crowned in Milan on 26 May that year. The new coinage to which the proclamation refers, at a reduced 66 shillings to the pound troy, was the direct result of the Coinage Act of 1816, which established Britain on the gold standard. Prior to the introduction of the new coins themselves, the Mint, under the indefatigable master William Wellesley Pole (1763-1845), was reorganised with new equipment and more staff. Production began in early July 1816 and coins were stockpiled. Distribution of the new coin, in batches of six £100 bags to individual country banks and exchange stations, began on 18 January 1817 and the stations opened on 13 February; closure followed two weeks later, after which the old silver coin was demonetised

Haile Selassie, who had fled Ethiopia in 1936 with the onset of Italian fascist rule, returned to Addis Ababa in April 1941 following liberation of his country by British forces. The currency situation remained dire, however, with locals favouring Maria Theresa dollars over coins of the East African Currency Board and even Indian rupees. The new State Bank of Ethiopia, established in August 1942, expressed its financial results in Maria Theresa dollars and the government prohibited exports of these coins, worth, as they were, a third more than East African currency. In June 1943 Yilma Deressa, Ethiopia's Vice Minister of Finance, met his counterparts in the US and an agreement was signed in August 1943. This led in turn to a formal order for minting of newly-designed Ethiopian coins, in five denominations, engraved by John Sinnock and Gilroy Roberts, respectively Chief Engraver and Chief Sculptor at the Philadelphia mint, and made in June 1944. The new money was officially inaugurated on 23 July 1945, Haile Selassie's birthday

The money was mainly invested in farm land and the rent was to pay for the running of the school. The school was opened in 1668, one year after Sir Thomas's death. He decreed that the pupils should wear 'blue coats and caps according to the laudable usage of Christ Church Hospital in London.' The blue drugget gown and yellow stockings were replaced in 1882 by the modern equivalent, the distinctive blue blazer; this badge and the next pre-date 1882. The school moved to its present location from the centre of Gloucester in May 1964.

John Elder, bookseller and stationer, North Bridge street, Edinburgh, and William Stewart, merchant, were indicted for sedition at the High Court of Justiciary in Edinburgh on 10 January 1793, on a charge of compiling a document entitled *Rights of Man and the Origin of Government* in autumn 1792. The document, printed in an edition of some 3,000 copies by John Darling in Edinburgh, was distributed widely in the locality of the city and also via booksellers in Glasgow, Paisley, Port Glasgow and Anstruther. Elder and Stewart conspired with James Bell, a 'tinman' in Leith, for Bell to 'cast and throw off several thousand of the said medals' in the autumn of 1792, which saw wide circulation at the time. Court proceedings for the period January to March 1793 do not record any prosecution of Elder or his associates, who failed to appear before the judiciary and were declared outlaws

On 23 September 1779 the U.S.S. Bonhomme Richard, under the command of Capt. John Paul Jones (1747-92), led a combined Franco-American fleet of five ships against a large Baltic merchant fleet being escorted by the British ships H.M.S. Serapis and the smaller Countess of Scarborough. The fighting took place off the Yorkshire coast near Flamborough Head and the coastal town of Bridlington, when the French Capt. Landais of the Alliance engaged the Countess of Scarborough, leaving Serapis to battle against the four remaining American and French ships. Initially considerable damage was inflicted to the hull and rigging of the Bonhomme Richard and the American flag fell, prompting Capt. Richard Pearson of the Serapis to ask Jones if he had intentionally struck his colour in surrender. Jones defiantly replied: "I have not yet begun to fight!" and after a further three hours of bitter exchange it was the Serapis and Countess of Scarborough that were forced to surrender. The Americans boarded and transferred across to the Serapis following a close, hard-fought victory, with the critically-damaged Bonhomme Richard sinking on the following day. The victory made John Paul Jones a national hero and this piece holds the distinction of being the only naval medal authorized by the Continental Congress

If before DNW remit the 'sale proceeds' to the seller, the buyer makes a claim to rescind the sale that is appropriate and DNW is of the opinion that the claim is justified, DNW is authorised to rescind the sale and refund to the buyer any amount paid to DNW in respect of the lot.

17 Payment of sale proceeds

DNW shall remit the 'sale proceeds' to the seller not later than 35 days after the auction, but if by that date DNW has not received the 'total amount due' from the buyer then DNW will remit the sale proceeds within five working days after the date on which the 'total amount due' is received from the buyer. If credit terms have been agreed between DNW and the buyer, DNW shall remit to the seller the sale proceeds not later than 35 days after the auction unless otherwise agreed by the seller.

18 If the buyer fails to pay to DNW the 'total amount due' within 3 weeks after the auction, DNW will endeavour to notify the seller and take the seller's instructions as to the appropriate course of action and, so far as in DNW's opinion is practicable, will assist the seller to recover the 'total amount due' from the buyer. If circumstances do not permit DNW to take instructions from the seller, the seller authorises DNW at the seller's expense to agree special terms for payment of the 'total amount due', to remove, store and insure the lot sold, to settle claims made by or against the buyer on such terms as DNW shall in its absolute discretion think fit, to take such steps as are necessary to collect monies due by the buyer to the seller and if necessary to rescind the sale and refund money to the buyer if appropriate

19 If, notwithstanding that, the buyer fails to pay to DNW the 'total amount due' within three weeks after the auction and DNW remits the 'sale proceeds' to the seller, the ownership of the lot shall pass to DNW.

20 Charges for withdrawn lots

Where a seller cancels instructions for sale, DNW reserve the right to charge a fee of 15 per cent of DNW's then latest middle estimate of the auction price of the property withdrawn, together with Value Added Tax thereon if the seller is resident in the European Union, and 'expenses' incurred in relation to the property.

21 Rights to photographs and illustrations

The seller gives DNW full and absolute right to photograph and illustrate any lot placed in its hands for sale and to use such photographs and illustrations and any photographs and illustrations provided by the seller at any time at its absolute discretion (whether or not in connection with the auction).

22 Unsold lots

Where any lot fails to sell, DNW shall notify the seller accordingly. The seller shall make arrangements either to re-offer the lot for sale or to collect the lot.

23 DNW reserve the right to charge commission up to one-half of the 'stated rates' calculated on the 'bought-in price' and in addition 'expenses' in respect of any unsold lots.

General Conditions and Definitions

- 24 DNW sells as agent for the seller (except where it is stated wholly or partly to own any lot as principal) and as such is not responsible for any default by seller or buyer.
- 25 Any representation or statement by DNW, in any catalogue as to authorship, attribution, genuineness, origin, date, age, provenance, condition or estimated selling price is a statement of opinion only. Every person interested should exercise and rely on his or her own judgement as to such matters and neither DNW nor its servants or agents are responsible for the correctness of such opinions.
- 26 Whilst the interests of prospective buyers are best served by attendance at the auction, DNW will, if so instructed, execute bids on their behalf. Neither DNW nor its servants or agents are responsible for any neglect or default in doing so or for failing to do so.
- 27 DNW shall have the right, at its discretion, to refuse admission to its premises or attendance at its auctions by any person.
- 28 DNW has absolute discretion without giving any reason to refuse any bid, to divide any lot, to combine any two or more lots, to withdraw any lot from the auction and in case of dispute to put up any lot for auction again.
- 29 (a) Any indemnity under these Conditions shall extend to all actions, proceedings costs, expenses, claims and demands whatever incurred or suffered by the person entitled to the benefit of the indemnity.
- (b) DNW declares itself to be a trustee for its relevant servants and agents of the benefit of every indemnity under these Conditions to the extent that such indemnity is expressed to be for the benefit of its servants and agents.
- 30 Any notice by DNW to a seller, consignor, prospective bidder or buyer may be given by first class mail or airmail and if so given shall be deemed to have been duly received by the addressee 48 hours after posting.
- 31 These Conditions shall be governed by and construed in accordance with English law. All transactions to which these Conditions apply and all matters connected therewith shall also be governed by English law. DNW hereby submits to the exclusive jurisdiction of the English courts and all other parties concerned hereby submit to the non-exclusive jurisdiction of the English courts.

32 In these Conditions:

- (a) 'catalogue' includes any advertisement, brochure, estimate, price list or other publication;
- (b) 'hammer price' means the price at which a lot is knocked down by the auctioneer to the buyer;
- (c) 'total amount due' means the 'hammer price' in respect of the lot sold together with any premium, Value Added Tax chargeable and additional charges and expenses due from a defaulting buyer in pounds sterling;
- (d) 'deliberate forgery' means an imitation made with the intention of deceiving as to authorship, origin, date, age, period, culture or source which is not shown to be such in the description in the catalogue and which at the date of the sale had a value materially less than it would have had if it had been in accordance with that description;
- (e) 'sale proceeds' means the net amount due to the seller being the 'hammer price' of the lot sold less commission at the 'stated rates' and 'expenses' and any other amounts due to DNW by the seller in whatever capacity and howsoever arising;
- (f) 'stated rate' means DNW's published rates of commission for the time and any Value Added Tax thereon;
- (g) 'expenses' in relation to the sale of any lot means DNW charges and expenses for insurance, illustrations, special advertising, packing and freight of that lot and any Value Added Tax thereon;
- (h) 'bought-in price' means 5 per cent more than the highest bid received below the reserve.

33 Vendors' commission of sales

A commission of 15 per cent is payable by the vendor on the hammer price on lots sold.

34 **VAT**

Commission, illustrations, insurance and advertising are subject to VAT if the seller is resident in the European Union.


