

Antony John Scammel (1937-2019)

Antony John Scammell was born in Bristol on 4 July 1937. His earliest memories were of the destruction of his neighbourhood in the Bristol Blitz and playing toy soldiers with his grandfather, a veteran of the First World War. During his education he was always fascinated with history, in particular the Roman and British Empires. In 1954, when his immediate family emigrated to Australia, he couldn't leave the country behind for patriotic reasons, so stayed behind and joined the regular army. After 3 years of active service with the Royal Tank Regiment, including during the 1956 Suez Crisis, Antony returned to a civilian life and forged a career in the financial sector.

By this point he had already started collecting coins and banknotes, almost exclusively from the Greek, Roman and British empires. Raising a family of four children meant that money was often scarce, but he continued to add to his collection whenever possible. By the mid 1980s Antony found himself a single man and his collecting reached new heights. All spare money at the end of each month was used to purchase strategically targeted coins, which were cherished and catalogued meticulously.

When his eldest son reached the age of 50, Antony decided to pass his treasured coin collections to him and his two brothers for them to cherish into the future. He then turned his attention to collecting other historical artefacts from multiple times and civilisations, right up until his death in July 2019.



John Roberts-Lewis (1936-2019)

John Roberts-Lewis, who died on 22 March 2019, was born in 1936. He spent his childhood in Wales with his Mother, who ran a café in Abergavenny.

He joined the army at age 18 and did his national service for nearly two years, but despite passing the entrance exams for Sandhurst he decided an army career was not for him. He then worked in the research department at Guest Keen's steelworks in Cardiff for a few years and completed his A-levels at night school. To further his career he then entered higher education at the University of Wales and obtained first class Bachelors degrees in Geology and Physics, which combined to constitute one of the first qualifications in Geophysics from the university. When he left university he took a post with Seismograph Service Ltd which began his career in oil exploration. Then he embarked on a long career with British Petroleum which took him all over the UK and the world.

He lived and worked in Yorkshire, the North Sea, France, Germany, Iran, Libya, Nigeria (in the swamps of the Niger Delta), Norway, Australia, and finally returned to London for a few years. Taking early retirement at the age of 50, he made use of his time renovating his house and land in Buckinghamshire. On retiring John was also able to indulge his interest in history and archaeology by lecturing at local history societies and travelling to ancient sites in Italy, Greece, Turkey, Albania, Tunisia, Jordan and the Inca Trail in South America, to name but a few.

John discovered his interest in coins whilst at preparatory school at the end of World War II. The first coin in his collection was a large copper Cartwheel twopence which he enjoyed rolling down the bed sheets when he was confined to bed with asthma. From the age of 8 he was bitten by the 'collecting bug' and began by focusing on coins from the British Isles; he went on to build his collection of British coins over the next 60 years. As a child he spent hours in museums and antique shops, where he particularly enjoyed the historical narratives illuminated by coinage of different eras. As a young man he wrote a numismatic column for the South Wales Echo, answering coin related questions posed by readers.

During his travels, John enjoyed archaeological holidays which piqued his interest in ancient coins; these soon formed a part of his collection. Although he became interested in foreign coins in his teens, thanks to coins collected at secondary school from pupils whose older family members had been with the forces overseas, he later developed his British Colonial coin collection in the 1970s whilst working at home and abroad. During the 1990s John gave greater attention to collecting tokens.

Despite his wide travels, John said he rarely purchased coins abroad, preferring the provenance of coins from trusted friends and dealers in London. And the prices at home were always better than in Hong Kong, apparently! Ever level-headed, he even declined the exciting offer of an interesting hoard of coins in Iran as he distrusted their source!!

John's British coins were sold by DNW in March 2015 and his ancients in September of that year. His trade tokens, a comprehensive group with the concentration on pieces issued by merchants and individuals for genuine commerce, rather than those for specious gain, were sold in November 2017. On 27 February this year we sold his Indian coins, which included a number of attractive rarities from the EIC presidency series. Now, finally, it is the turn of that part of his collection to which he was most devoted, his British Colonial coins. Specialists in this field will find much of interest here among the 251 lots, the majority of which were acquired between 40 and 50 years ago. This writer well remembers selling John many coins in the 1970s and early 1980s, when there were bountiful riches in the Colonial series to be had, both from the pages of Spink's Numismatic Circular and from the London salerooms. Now these and many others are back on the market again, ready for a new band of collectors to enjoy into the future.

The Leeds firm of Greenwood & Batley, founded in East street, Leeds, in 1856, removed in 1859 to the Albion Works at Armley. They supplied coining presses and associated machinery to a number of foreign mints. Abdur Rahman Khan (*c*. 1844-1901), grandson of Dost Mahomed, was invited by Lord Lytton, the Governor-General, to become Amir of Afghanistan after the cessation of the Second Afghan War in 1880. Rahman was promised further aid from Britain provided he adopt a pro-British foreign policy. One of the by-products of this was the appointment of Sir Thomas Acquin Martin (1850-1906) as his Agent-General in 1887. Martin, head of Martin & Co, civil engineers, of London and Clive street, Calcutta, in turn sent Sir Thomas Salter Pyne, KB, CSI (1860-1921) to Kabul, where Pyne reorganised the Kabul mint with presses ordered from Greenwood & Batley. The first of these presses, despatched from England on 19 October 1894, was for minting the new 39mm 5 rupee coin; this proving piece was almost certainly made at that time



The brass tokens of the Hudson's Bay Co are erroneously valued in 'new beaver'; the unit of the fur trade was the 'made beaver', an adult beaver skin in prime condition. The skin was never cut up, so the Company thought that tokens were the ideal way in which to express fractions of the made beaver. However, the native American first peoples in the East Main district (south and east of Hudson's Bay) preferred to trust the Company accounts rather than take the tokens and for this reason they never circulated widely. When it was decided to redeem them, c. 1860, the tokens, which were struck in England to the order of George Simpson McTavish, were punched on their reverses to cancel them

If credit terms have been agreed between DNW and the buyer, DNW shall remit to the seller the sale proceeds not later than 35 days after the auction unless otherwise agreed by the seller.

18 If the buyer fails to pay to DNW the 'total amount due' within 3 weeks after the auction, DNW will endeavour to notify the seller and take the seller's instructions as to the appropriate course of action and, so far as in DNW's opinion is practicable, will assist the seller to recover the 'total amount due' from the buyer. If circumstances do not permit DNW to take instructions from the seller, the seller authorises DNW at the seller's expense to agree special terms for payment of the 'total amount due', to remove, store and insure the lot sold, to settle claims made by or against the buyer on such terms as DNW shall in its absolute discretion think fit, to take such steps as are necessary to collect monies due by the buyer to the seller and if necessary to rescind the sale and refund money to the buyer if appropriate

19 If, notwithstanding that, the buyer fails to pay to DNW the 'total amount due' within three weeks after the auction and DNW remits the 'sale proceeds' to the seller, the ownership of the lot shall pass to DNW.

20 Charges for withdrawn lots

Where a seller cancels instructions for sale, DNW reserve the right to charge a fee of 15 per cent of DNW's then latest middle estimate of the auction price of the property withdrawn, together with Value Added Tax thereon if the seller is resident in the UK or European Union, and 'expenses' incurred in relation to the property.

21 Rights to photographs and illustrations

The seller gives DNW full and absolute right to photograph and illustrate any lot placed in its hands for sale and to use such photographs and illustrations and any photographs and illustrations provided by the seller at any time at its absolute discretion (whether or not in connection with the auction).

22 Unsold lots

Where any lot fails to sell, DNW shall notify the seller accordingly. The seller shall make arrangements either to re-offer the lot for sale or to collect the lot.

23 DNW reserve the right to charge commission up to one-half of the 'stated rates' calculated on the 'bought-in price' and in addition 'expenses' in respect of any unsold lots.

General Conditions and Definitions

24 DNW sells as agent for the seller (except where it is stated wholly or partly to own any lot as principal) and as such is not responsible for any default by seller or buyer.

25 Any representation or statement by DNW, in any catalogue as to authorship, attribution, genuineness, origin, date, age, provenance, condition or estimated selling price is a statement of opinion only. Every person interested should exercise and rely on his or her own judgement as to such matters and neither DNW nor its servants or agents are responsible for the correctness of such opinions.

26 Whilst the interests of prospective buyers are best served by attendance at the auction, DNW will, if so instructed, execute bids on their behalf. Neither DNW nor its servants or agents are responsible for any neglect or default in doing so or for failing to do so.

27 DNW shall have the right, at its discretion, to refuse admission to its premises or attendance at its auctions by any person.

28 DNW has absolute discretion without giving any reason to refuse any bid, to divide any lot, to combine any two or more lots, to withdraw any lot from the auction and in case of dispute to put up any lot for auction again.

29 (a) Any indemnity under these Conditions shall extend to all actions, proceedings costs, expenses, claims and demands whatever incurred or suffered by the person entitled to the benefit of the indemnity.

(b) DNW declares itself to be a trustee for its relevant servants and agents of the benefit of every indemnity under these Conditions to the extent that such indemnity is expressed to be for the benefit of its servants and agents.

30 Any notice by DNW to a seller, consignor, prospective bidder or buyer may be given by first class mail or airmail and if so given shall be deemed to have been duly received by the addressee 48 hours after posting.

31 These Conditions shall be governed by and construed in accordance with English law. All transactions to which these Conditions apply and all matters connected therewith shall also be governed by English law. DNW hereby submits to the exclusive jurisdiction of the English courts and all other parties concerned hereby submit to the non-exclusive jurisdiction of the English courts.

32 In these Conditions:

(a) 'catalogue' includes any advertisement, brochure, estimate, price list or other publication;

(b) 'hammer price' means the price at which a lot is knocked down by the auctioneer to the buyer;

(c) 'total amount due' means the 'hammer price' in respect of the lot sold together with any premium, Value Added Tax chargeable and additional charges and expenses due from a defaulting buyer in pounds sterling;

(d) 'deliberate forgery' means an imitation made with the intention of deceiving as to authorship, origin, date, age, period, culture or source which is not shown to be such in the description in the catalogue and which at the date of the sale had a value materially less than it would have had if it had been in accordance with that description;

(e) 'sale proceeds' means the net amount due to the seller being the 'hammer price' of the lot sold less commission at the 'stated rates' and 'expenses' and any other amounts due to DNW by the seller in whatever capacity and howsoever arising;

(f) 'stated rate' means DNW's published rates of commission for the time and any Value Added Tax thereon;

(g) 'expenses' in relation to the sale of any lot means DNW charges and expenses for insurance, illustrations, special advertising, packing and freight of that lot and any Value Added Tax thereon;

(h) 'bought-in price' means 5 per cent more than the highest bid received below the reserve.

33 Vendors' commission of sales

A commission of 15 per cent is payable by the vendor on the hammer price on lots sold.
