1 A matching pair of small bangles, the two yellow precious metal bangles with repeating pattern, court shape in profile, diameters 58mm. £700-£750

 \mathbf{S}^{mith} & Pepper was a jewellery manufacturing firm in Birmingham, located at 78-79 Vyse Street, and set up in 1899 by Mr Smith and his uncle Mr Pepper, who became business partners after Smith had split from his family business.

Birmingham expanded vastly during the industrial revolution of the 19th century, becoming a hub for new technologies and businesses. Jewellery making proved to be a very lucrative trade and the area thrived - by the 1900s, the trade employed over 30,000 people.

The company traded for 82 years, much of this time being run by generations of the Smith family after Mr Pepper left the business. Unfortunately by the 1980s, the elder members of the family could not secure the future involvement of younger family members to continue the business. So one friday in 1981, the company closed, the workers downed tools and the factory was abandoned. The building was left shut for 9 years before the Council acquired possession of the premises and opened the doors to find a perfectly preserved time capsule of jewellery production, dating back to 1899. The premises is now part of the Museum of the Jewellery Quarter.





The locket was formerly the property of **Edward William Thomas Fiander** (1898-1982), from Lambeth. Fiander was the chief mechanical engineer in the 1920s to **T.E.Lawrence** (1888-1935) (*'Lawrence of Arabia'*) whilst he was in Egypt. Thence by family descent.

Angelica Kauffmann (1741-1807) was a Swiss classical artist who had a highly successful career in London and Rome, and was a skilled artist in portraiture, historical genre and landscape. Kauffmann was one of the two female founding members of the Royal Academy in London in 1768, the other being Mary Moser.

The Portrait of a Lady as a Vestal Virgin, painted 1781-2, is now in the collection of the Gemäldegalerie Alte Meister in Dresden.





23 A Victorian gold mounted oval shell cameo brooch, finely carved to depict a bacchante with cascading fruiting vines to her hair, within ropetwist and guilloche applied gold mount, with pendant suspensory loop to the reverse, length 62mm.

The arms of the **City of Leith** were granted on 27th February 1889. By 1920, the burgh had been merged into Edinburgh.

The Leith arms depict the Virgin and Infant Saviour in her arms, seated within a galley with two masts, beneath a cloud, often depicted with the motto 'Persevere' below. The parish church of South Leith is dedicated to St Mary and the ship signifies the port and its seafaring trade. The significance of the cloud above the ship is not clear but was possibly taken from an image on an old Burgh seal, and it was suggested to be a protecting cloud.

Angela Cummings

Born in Austria in 1944, Angela Cummings grew up in America, close to Washington DC, travelling to Perugia, Italy to study painting at the Academia di Belle Arti, plus a degree as a gemologist, goldsmith and designer in Germany, at the Staatliche Zeichenakademie in Hanau. After her studies, she returned to the United States, and in 1968 took the position as in-house designer at Tiffany & Co. In 1975, whilst still working at Tiffany, she launched her own brand *Angela Cummings Exclusively for Tiffany & Co.* Along with her contemporaries Donald Clafl in, Paloma Picasso and Elsa Peretti, she was given the honour of signing her own work.

In 1984, after her 18 year partnership with Tiffany, Cummings left the company, and established her own business with her husband Bruce Cummings. Her fi rst boutique opened in the New York department store, Bergdorf Goodman on 5th Avenue, quickly leading to further success and expansion. In 1990, Angela Cummings Inc formed an alliance with Shiseido The Giza, opening stores and boutiques throughout Japan. In 2003, Angela retired, moving to Utah with her family and closing all her boutiques, although in 2013 she was tempted back into designing a limited edition collection for the pearl specialist Assael.

Angela's distinctive designs combine bold, modern and colourful styles, often using unusual materials, such as black jade, wood, black opals, as well as mother-o'-pearl, coral and lapis lazuli.

Marina B

Born in 1930 to one of the world's most famous family jewel houses, Bulgari, Marina Bulgari grew up in Rome, Athens and Corfu. She worked in the family business for several years before launching her own jewellery range in 1976, making her name as one of the leading women designers of this generation, whilst honouring her family's long and prestigious heritage. Her bold and contemporary designs, with a strong Italian flavour, proved hugely successful, and Marina opened her first showroom in Geneva in 1978, with further boutiques following in Milan, Paris and New York, Jeddah and Tokyo. She designed a signature cut and shape of gemstone - between a pear-cut and a triangular cut - which can be found throughout her jewellery designs. In 1999 Marina sold her company to the Sheik of Jeddah, Ahmed Fitaihi, of Saudi Arabia.

Founded in 1860 by George Chatila in Beirut, today Chatila is a third and fourth generation owned family business. The company relocated to Switzerland in 1983 setting up its flagship store in Geneva, followed later in 1987 by their second principle showroom in London's Old Bond Street. Chatila are renowned for their speciality in coloured diamonds and fine gemstones, as well as their intricate craftsmanship and elaborate settings.

Minas

inas was born in Athens in 1938 to a Greek family of migrants from Asia Minor. From a young age he showed his interest and love for design. At 15, he began an internship with Angelos Vourakis, the official jewellery supplier to the Greek royal court, which led to his first job in the art of jewellery making.

In 1959, Minas began his military service in the Greek Royal Navy, gaining an interest and experience in mechanical engineering. Leaving Greece in 1969, with 200 dollars in his pocket and a one way ticket to America, he quickly secured a job with David Webb, one of the most famous jewellery manufacturers of the time. He soon set up his own workshop in New York, creating and marketing his own designs, focusing on the themes of simplicity, ergonomics and harmony. By 1976 he began exporting his jewellery to Italy, moving to Milan to cooperate fully with leading gemologist Roberto Cusi.

After Cusi's death in 1981, Minas returned to his homeland Greece, continuing to develop his designs for furniture and machinery as well as jewellery. In 1986 he moved to the island of Mykonos, and in 1992 exhibited his full body of work at the Zoumboulakis Gallery. During that year he made contact with the Danish company Georg Jensen and his 12 year cooperation with the brand began, leading to major exhibitions in Copenhagen, New York, London and Paris. He opened his first official store in Mykonos in 1998 and second store in Athens in 2005.

Zolotas

The Greek jewellery house of **Zolotas** was founded in 1895 by Efthimios Zolotas, at Aiolou Street, in Athens, a family run business that has continued through the decades of the 20th century, opening a new showroom in Paris in the 1970s and still maintaining its family tradition today. The 1950s and 60s saw inspiration drawn directly from the Greek cultural heritage, reviving mythological themes from Ancient Greece. Customers in the early 60s included included Aristotle Onassis, the Kennedys, Elizabeth Taylor and Maria Callas.



Shaun Leane

Born in 1969, Shaun Leane is a British goldsmith and longtime collaborator with the late fashion designer Lee Alexander McQueen, CBE.

At the age of sixteen, Shaun Leane started a seven-year apprenticeship in Hatton Garden with the company English Traditional Jewellery. On completion of his training, he continued to work for the firm for another six years, specialising in the restoration and reproduction of Victorian, Art Nouveau and Art Deco jewels. A chance meeting with Alexander McQueen in 1992 allowed Leane to begin creating his own pieces. Having initially bonded over a mutual desire for creative freedom, the pair went on to design and make iconic and provocative catwalk jewels that challenged perceptions of sculptural form and femininity. Their passion for craftsmanship and symbolic design bridged the worlds of fashion and jewellery and saw the creation of threedimensional pieces considered contemporary works of art in their own right. The use of less traditional materials, such as aluminium, chosen for their creative versatility rather than intrinsic value, was a theme also seen in the designs of other British jewellers, such as Andrew Grima and John Donald.

Leane and McQueen worked together for over 17 years up until McQueen's death in 2010.

During his career Leane has collaborated with various houses, including Asprey, Boucheron, De Beers and Givenchy. His jewels are regularly seen on the red carpet, worn by celebrities such as Björk, Elton John, Kate Moss and Lady Gaga.

In 2011 thirty of his works were exhibited at the Victoria and Albert Museum's retrospective exhibition, Alexander McQueen: Savage Beauty. He is the four-time recipient of the UK Jewellery Designer of the Year, and, in 2020, published an extensive and personal monograph charting his 36 years as a designer-maker.





Provenance: Formerly the property of Marie-Louise Countess Manvers (1889-1984), an acclaimed and productive artist, (painting under the name Marie-Louise Pierrepont), and thence by descent.

Born Marie-Louise Roosevelt Butterfield in Ghent in 1889, she was the only child of Lord Frederick and Lady Butterfield of Cliffe Castle Keighley, Yorkshire. In 1917, Marie-Louise married Captain Gervas Evelyn Pierrepont (1881-1955), the sixth Earl Manvers JP MC & Duke of Kingston on Hull.

On her death, the necklace passed to her only surviving child, Lady Frederica Rozelle Ridgway Pierrepont (1925-2015). During the Second World War, Lady Rozelle joined the Wrens and she saw the effects of the war close up, as the wounded were brought home across the Channel. She was particularly moved by the condition of German prisoners of war, remembering: "I suddenly became aware of the indescribable tragedy and horror of war. These were no proud and noble specimens of the Aryan race but a pathetic collection of underfed, tired and ill-looking youths wearing the ragged remains of their uniforms, with a forlorn and hopeless look in their eyes." (Obituary: The Independent, June 2015).

Lady Rozelle went on to sail single handed across the Baltic in her yacht, the Martha McGilda, which she had purchased in 1956. She set up a charitable trust teaching East End boys in care sailing in the London docks, and later worked with refugees displaced from Yugoslavia. Her first marriage in 1953 had ended in divorce and she married Richard Hollings Raynes in 1965, later becoming an author, and writing under the pen name Rozelle Raynes.

The **dog rose** - or 'rose canina', also known as 'eglantine', was said to represent 'pleasure and pain' in the 'language of flowers'.

Floriography (the language of flowers) reached a zenith in Victorian England in the 19th century, as well as enjoying huge popularity in France and the United States. Gifts of blooms and specific floral arrangements were used to send coded messages to the recipient, allowing the sender to tacitly express their feelings which could not otherwise be spoken.

Hundreds of publications were dedicated to the subject. Joseph Hammer-Purgstall's *Dictionnaire du Langage des Fleurs* (1809) appears to be the first published list associating flowers with symbolic definitions, whilst the first dictionary of floriography appears in 1819 when Louise Cortambert, writing under the pen name of Madame Charlotte de la Tour, wrote *Le Langage des Fleurs*.

The subject was to remain popular until the 1880s.

K Serkisoff & Co was a Turkish wholesale importer established under the Ottoman Empire in Istanbul (formerly Constantinople) and from 1880 were the exclusive suppliers for the Turkish National Railways. Since that date, it has been a tradition to present a **Serkisoff** railway watch to employees retiring from the Turkish Railways, a tradition that has continued until just a few years ago.

Avia is a Swiss watch company with a history dating back to the end of the 19th century. They made good mechanical lever movement watches under their own brand name and provided watches and movements for other brands including New York, The Ball Watch company and A Wittnauer.

This style of watch, collectively known as 'aviator's watches', date from the late 1930s-early 1940s. The IWC MkIX is probably the best known, but similar models were produced by Zenith, Movado, Omega, Hevetia and Avia. It is thought they were designed for and used by the nascent German Luftwaffe pilots, although they were not officially issued. The design, with the large case with oversized winder (suitable for handling whilst wearing gloves), radium numerals and hands and rotating bezel with moveable marker point, can be seen as the precursor to the WWII Luftwaffe Hanhart chronographs. The moveable bezel marker allowed pilots and navigators to easily log the passing of time - vital for calculating distances, fuel consumption, etc., in these early aircraft.



Where a reserve has been placed, only the auctioneer may bid on behalf of the seller.

15 Authority to deduct commission and expenses

The seller authorises DNW to deduct commission at the 'stated rate' and 'expenses' from the 'hammer price' and acknowledges DNW's right to retain the premium payable by the buyer.

16 Rescission of sale

If before DNW remit the 'sale proceeds' to the seller, the buyer makes a claim to rescind the sale that is appropriate and DNW is of the opinion that the claim is justified, DNW is authorised to rescind the sale and refund to the buyer any amount paid to DNW in respect of the lot.

17 Payment of sale proceeds

DNW shall remit the 'sale proceeds' to the seller not later than 35 days after the auction, but if by that date DNW has not received the 'total amount due' from the buyer then DNW will remit the sale proceeds within five working days after the date on which the 'total amount due' is received from the buyer. If credit terms have been agreed between DNW and the buyer, DNW shall remit to the seller the sale proceeds not later than 35 days after the auction unless otherwise agreed by the seller.

18 If the buyer fails to pay to DNW the 'total amount due' within 3 weeks after the auction, DNW will endeavour to notify the seller and take the seller's instructions as to the appropriate course of action and, so far as in DNW's opinion is practicable, will assist the seller to recover the 'total amount due' from the buyer. If circumstances do not permit DNW to take instructions from the seller, the seller authorises DNW at the seller's expense to agree special terms for payment of the 'total amount due', to remove, store and insure the lot sold, to settle claims made by or against the buyer on such terms as DNW shall in its absolute discretion think fit, to take such steps as are necessary to collect monies due by the buyer to the seller and if necessary to rescind the sale and refund money to the buyer if appropriate

19 If, notwithstanding that, the buyer fails to pay to DNW the 'total amount due' within three weeks after the auction and DNW remits the 'sale proceeds' to the seller, the ownership of the lot shall pass to DNW.

20 Charges for withdrawn lots

Where a seller cancels instructions for sale, DNW reserve the right to charge a fee of 15 per cent of DNW's then latest middle estimate of the auction price of the property withdrawn, together with Value Added Tax thereon if the seller is resident in the UK, and 'expenses' incurred in relation to the property.

21 Rights to photographs and illustrations

The seller gives DNW full and absolute right to photograph and illustrate any lot placed in its hands for sale and to use such photographs and illustrations and any photographs and illustrations provided by the seller at any time at its absolute discretion (whether or not in connection with the auction).

22 Unsold lots

Where any lot fails to sell, DNW shall notify the seller accordingly. The seller shall make arrangements either to reoffer the lot for sale or to collect the lot.

23 DNW reserve the right to charge commission up to one-half of the 'stated rates' calculated on the 'bought-in price' and in addition 'expenses' in respect of any unsold lots.

General Conditions and Definitions

- 24 DNW sells as agent for the seller (except where it is stated wholly or partly to own any lot as principal) and as such is not responsible for any default by seller or buyer.
- 25 Any representation or statement by DNW, in any catalogue as to authorship, attribution, genuineness, origin, date, age, provenance, condition or estimated selling price is a statement of opinion only. Every person interested should exercise and rely on his or her own judgement as to such matters and neither DNW nor its servants or agents are responsible for the correctness of such opinions.
- 26 Whilst the interests of prospective buyers are best served by attendance at the auction, DNW will, if so instructed, execute bids on their behalf. Neither DNW nor its servants or agents are responsible for any neglect or default in doing so or for failing to do so.
- 27 DNW shall have the right, at its discretion, to refuse admission to its premises or attendance at its auctions by any person.
- 28 DNW has absolute discretion without giving any reason to refuse any bid, to divide any lot, to combine any two or more lots, to withdraw any lot from the auction and in case of dispute to put up any lot for auction again.
- 29 (a) Any indemnity under these Conditions shall extend to all actions, proceedings costs, expenses, claims and demands whatever incurred or suffered by the person entitled to the benefit of the indemnity.
- (b) DNW declares itself to be a trustee for its relevant servants and agents of the benefit of every indemnity under these Conditions to the extent that such indemnity is expressed to be for the benefit of its servants and agents.
- 30 Any notice by DNW to a seller, consignor, prospective bidder or buyer may be given by first class mail or airmail and if so given shall be deemed to have been duly received by the addressee 48 hours after posting.
- 31 These Conditions shall be governed by and construed in accordance with English law. All transactions to which these Conditions apply and all matters connected therewith shall also be governed by English law. DNW hereby submits to the exclusive jurisdiction of the English courts and all other parties concerned hereby submit to the non-exclusive jurisdiction of the English courts.

32 In these Conditions:

- (a) 'catalogue' includes any advertisement, brochure, estimate, price list or other publication;
- (b) 'hammer price' means the price at which a lot is knocked down by the auctioneer to the buyer;
- (c) 'total amount due' means the 'hammer price' in respect of the lot sold together with any premium, Value Added Tax chargeable and additional charges and expenses due from a defaulting buyer in pounds sterling;
- (d) 'deliberate forgery' means an imitation made with the intention of deceiving as to authorship, origin, date, age, period, culture or source which is not shown to be such in the description in the catalogue and which at the date of the sale had a value materially less than it would have had if it had been in accordance with that description;
- (e) 'sale proceeds' means the net amount due to the seller being the 'hammer price' of the lot sold less commission at the 'stated rates' and 'expenses' and any other amounts due to DNW by the seller in whatever capacity and howsoever arising;
- (f) 'stated rate' means DNW's published rates of commission for the time and any Value Added Tax thereon;
- (g) 'expenses' in relation to the sale of any lot means DNW charges and expenses for insurance, illustrations, special advertising, packing and freight of that lot and any Value Added Tax thereon;
- (h) 'bought-in price' means 5 per cent more than the highest bid received below the reserve.

33 Vendors' commission of sales

A commission of 15 per cent is payable by the vendor on the hammer price on lots sold.
